PLANNING COMMISSION: Commissioners advise City Council on zoning decisions, development plans and policies; and provide a forum for citizen input. There are two open seats and the commission meets the 3rd Tuesday monthly, with occasional additional meetings/worksessions throughout the year

PARKS & ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION: This Advisory Body provides input on policies, practices and proposals around sustainable use and management of the City's environmental resources. There are two open seats and the commission meets quarterly on the first Monday in March, June, September and December, with occasional additional meetings/worksessions throughout the year.

TO APPLY: Applications for both commissions are now open. Deadline to apply is Nov. 10; interviews will be held Nov. 17. The term is three years and begins Jan. 1, 2026. Commissioners are paid per meeting.



CORE CITY FUNCTIONS & PRIORITIES: Your city government operates through several departments, each playing a vital role in daily life. Your input shapes the City's ongoing goals and priorities. Here's where we are focused:



DEPARTMENT	FUNCTION & PRIORITY
Administration	Leadership, city planning, and public support; sustainability & climate resilience; effective communication
Finance	Manages city budgets, spending, and financial planning, and oversees the responsible use of taxpayer funds to maintain city services and quality infrastructure
Public Safety	Professional Police and Fire services, preserving the peace and safety of the community, 24/7/365, rapid emergency readiness; response under 3 minutes
Public Works & Parks	Snow removal, road maintenance, utility services, and upkeep of streets, sidewalks, and recreational spaces, well-maintained utilities, and active support for community events
Municipal Liquor Stores	City-operated retail operations to generate revenue to support public services

UNDERSTANDING CITY FUNDS: To manage operations effectively, the City separates finances into specific funds, each with its own purpose and source of revenue.

COLD WEATHER ENERGY-SAVING TIPS FOR YOUR HOME

With colder months approaching, keep these energy-saving tips in mind to help your household save money and stay warm this fall and winter.



Before reaching to turn the thermostat up –

Bundle up and double check that all storm windows in your home are completely closed. At night, draw your shades or blinds to keep rooms warmer. And don't forget to switch your ceiling fans to spin clockwise to push warm air down into the room!

Manage your temperature –

Save up to \$180 a year by lowering the temperature on your home thermostat 7°F – 10°F when you're away or asleep. For the best of both worlds, upgrade to a programmable or smart thermostat to warm your home before you wake up or return home.

Take care of your furnaces, vents and heaters so they can take care of you –

Replace or clean your furnace filter every three months or when it looks dirty. And vacuum or dust vent covers and radiator fins to keep your system working at peak efficiency.

Avoid heating unused areas of your home by closing vents or turning down the heat to those areas if able. Use space heaters wisely by directing them towards people, not spaces, and keeping flammable materials away.

RESIDENTIAL SOLAR TAX CREDIT REMINDER

Do you have plans to install rooftop solar on your home by the end of 2025? The residential solar federal tax credit is set to expire on December 31, 2025. Homeowners need to have their solar systems fully installed and commissioned by this date to qualify for the full 30% tax credit.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

Pedestrians remain among the most vulnerable road users. Please keep the following tips in mind:

1. Use Crosswalks. Always cross at designated crosswalks or intersections where drivers expect to see pedestrians.
2. Stay Visible. Wear bright or reflective clothing, especially in early morning or evening hours.
3. Avoid Distractions. Keep phones down and stay alert while crossing streets.
4. Make Eye Contact. Be sure drivers see you before stepping into the road, never assume vehicle will stop.

CHARGE INTO FIRE SAFETY: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home

Fire Prevention Week 2025
Oct. 5-11

Each year, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) celebrates Fire Prevention Week.

This year's theme, *"Charge Into Fire Safety: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home,"* is focused on safe use of the powerful batteries found in everyday devices. From phones and tablets to power tools, vacuums, lawn equipment, e-bikes, and even cars, lithium-ion batteries are part of modern life. But if damaged, improperly charged, or exposed to extreme heat, they can overheat, catch fire, or even explode.

WHY IT MATTERS

Lithium-ion battery fires burn hotter and spread faster than many other types of fires, and they can be difficult to extinguish. Prevention is your best protection.



RECYCLE RESPONSIBLY:
Never throw lithium-ion batteries in household trash or curbside recycling bins. Bring them to an authorized recycling site. Find a site at call2recycle.org.

SAFETY TIPS:

Buy Smart: Choose batteries with safety certifications such as UL, ETL, or CSA


Charge Safely:

- Place batteries on a hard, flat, nonflammable surface while charging
- Unplug as soon as the battery is fully charged
- Avoid charging overnight or when you're not home

Use the Right Equipment: Always use the charger and cords provided by the manufacturer. For replacements, purchase directly from the manufacturer or a trusted supplier.

Know the Warning Signs: Stop using the device if the battery smells strange, feels excessively hot, makes popping or hissing noises, bulges, or changes color.

Store with Care: Keep batteries away from direct sunlight, high heat, or freezing temperatures. Do not store them in vehicles during extreme weather.

If you do not subscribe to the seasonal yard waste service and have yard waste that you need collected, you can either add seasonal yard waste service now or schedule a one-time yard waste pickup.

WINTER SNOW REMINDERS



- **NO PARKING** on any street for a period of 48 hours, beginning immediately after two (2) inches or more of continuous snowfall, or until the snow removal has been completed curb to curb
- **DO NOT PLACE TRASH or RECYCLING CARTS** in the street
- **DO NOT PLOW, BLOW OR SHOVEL SNOW INTO THE STREET**
- **STAY BACK** when driving behind plows
- **KEEP YOUR WALK SAFE:** Required for owner or occupant of any property next to a public sidewalk.
- **WITHIN 24 HOURS**, remove snow and ice from sidewalks (including walks where Public Works does an initial pass with their equipment).



Help your Neighbors! Eastside Meals on Wheels (EMoW) needs meal delivery volunteers and donations.

About 10% of the EMoW client base lives in Saint Anthony Village. We have two delivery routes in the City. Qualifying seniors are never denied meals even if they cannot afford to contribute toward their meal costs. **Meals on Wheels** allows older adults to remain in their own homes longer without the significant cost of nursing home care. Through July 2025, EMoW served 208 clients over 24,500 meals.

Pedestrian Safety Improvements in Saint Anthony Village



Recent years have shown an increase in pedestrian-vehicle collisions, highlighting the vulnerability of pedestrians on the road. Several reasons contribute to this surge including increased speeds and reduced vigilance. Moreover, distracted driving due to the prevalence of smartphones and electronic devices, impaired driving, speeding and inadequate pedestrian infrastructure have all played a role in pedestrian-related crashes and fatalities. The City has prioritized improvements to enhance pedestrian safety throughout the Village.

THE FOLLOWING PROJECTS WERE PRIORITIZED FOR IMPLEMENTATION IN 2025:

> Installation of Flashing Stop Signs at 29th Avenue and Silver Lake Road

Flashing stop signs with LED lights to improve visibility and alert drivers at intersections, especially in low-light or high-traffic areas, to help reduce crashes.

> Driver Feedback Signs on Silver Lane

Signs at crosswalks remind drivers of their speed to increase awareness of pedestrians and encourage slower, safer driving – especially at this location.

> Pedestrian Crossing at 34th Avenue and Silver Lake Road including Rapid Rectangular Flashing Beacons (RRFBs)

The crossing will include a “refuge area” where pedestrians can wait after crossing half the street, to safely cross the second lane of traffic. In addition, RRFBs will be installed to further enhance pedestrian safety at the highly-utilized crossing. When a pedestrian pushes the button, the lights flash quickly in an alternating pattern to warn drivers that someone wants to cross.

Ernie has worked for the City for 19 years and will continue a strong tradition of outstanding leadership in our Public Works Department. Staff across all departments speak highly of Ernie and his positive attitude. Inflow & Infiltration Inspection Reminder

Two inspections are required prior to listing your home or business for sale:

- Sanitary sewer line inspection video
- Sump pump inspection



This ordinance (§50.16) is intended to help reduce peak sanitary sewer flows caused by Inflow and infiltration.

Inflow and Infiltration (I/I) is the excess flow of clear water into the City's sanitary sewer system. The system is not designed to handle excess clear water and it can become overloaded and cause basement flooding or bypass raw wastewater to local streams and lakes.

UPDATE: 2025 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The Contractor has substantially completed the street reconstruction and utility replacements along MacAlaster Drive and asphalt resurfacing along the following roadways:

- 39th Avenue NE: Stinson Boulevard to Silver Lake Road
- 30th Avenue NE: Stinson Boulevard to Silver Lake Road
- Armour Terrace: Roosevelt Street to Silver Lake Road
- Murray Avenue: Roosevelt Street to Coolidge Street
- 29th Avenue NE: Silver Lake Road to Highway 88
- Roosevelt Street: St. Anthony Boulevard to 30th Avenue NE
- Wilson Street: St. Anthony Boulevard to 30th Avenue NE
- Coolidge Street: St. Anthony Boulevard to 29th Avenue NE
- Anthony Lane: 29th Avenue NE to cul-de-sac

The optimal season for restoration (seeding) runs from spring to early summer and again from fall until the ground freezes. As the temperatures cool and precipitation increases with fall weather, newly seeded areas have optimal conditions to germinate and combat weeds. The contractor will return in the spring to complete any final turf establishment and place the final layer of asphalt pavement along MacAlaster Drive.



Principal Use Expectations

The zoning ordinance sets an expectation for the “principal use” of property and then defines a number of “accessory uses” that are allowed to accompany the principal use. In neighborhoods zoned for single family residential, those districts are set aside for just that – single family homes. Accessory uses are those activities that support residential living, such as garages and automobile parking, recreational uses like swimming pools and gazebos, and other things most of us commonly think of in residential neighborhoods.

Recent years have brought changes to how we use our homes, not the least of which is the growth in the need for home office space. Home offices are a variety of a larger example of accessory uses known as “Home Occupations.” In most cases, home office space is a convenience, and a small, or even unnoticeable, impact on the residential character of the property and the neighborhood.



When the business use grows into a more robust venture, however, that business activity can become a nuisance and interrupt the neighborhood character that is a component of people’s expectations for residential areas. Perhaps the business activity results in the desire to have employees report to the home office, or customers using the business services that create traffic to a level far beyond a typical residence. In this case, a question arises about “principal” use as opposed to “accessory” use. General Rule of Thumb: If business use is not very noticeable to the neighbors, it’s likely to be consistent with the zoning regulations.

Density Presents a Challenge

The interest in increasing property use (whether through more intensive activity on an individual lot, or more units on that parcel) adds complexity to what might otherwise be thought of as a simple change. One example of this complexity is in managing the stormwater running off expanded hard surfaces. This environmental challenge increases in direct proportion as we increase the size and intensity of use.



Other challenges include upholding the privacy many seek on single family properties – or creating it for multiple family neighborhoods. As the availability of private recreational space shrinks, it can impact demand for public park and trail development. Intensity of use in neighborhoods can affect traffic, noise, demands on utilities, and other expectations we have for traditional residential living, requiring a delicate balancing act as we consider how residential property use evolves.

One of the greatest challenges for the City’s zoning work is to balance changing demands for land use with the impact of those changes on neighborhoods, as well as on the public generally. Thriving, livable neighborhoods – regardless of density – are central to the Village’s success. Zoning is just one tool that Saint Anthony Village uses to promote that success.

There has been a significant national shift from alcohol to low-dose THC/CBD edibles and beverages, as well as non-alcoholic beer, wine and spirits. Sales of these alternatives are up 28% year-to-date over the same period in 2024. Our alcohol sales declined 6% in 2024 compared to 2023, with the exception of THC/CBD products. We’re working to remain relevant by enhancing your shopping experience and appealing to younger consumers and those seeking alternatives to alcohol.

Impact on Municipal Liquor Stores

As alcohol consumption trends shift, our Liquor Store profits may continue to decline. These profits are critical to funding city services like Police, Fire and Public Works. We must adapt to maintain this essential revenue stream.

Why Consider Cannabis Sales?

Our mission includes responsible control of adult consumables while generating sustainable revenue for the community. A cannabis store would be a legal, logical extension of our operations, allowing us to offer compliant, high-quality products. *This expansion could help offset declining alcohol sales and meet changing customer preferences.*

Minnesota Cannabis Licensing

Minnesota is limiting initial cannabis licenses to 150 applicants as well as municipal operators like us. Our application has been approved to continue the process. No final approvals have been issued yet.

Next Steps

After extensive research, we continue to explore opening a cannabis store. We retain the flexibility to discontinue the project if needed. Our current focus is on evaluating potential locations, product offerings, and staffing needs – all with financial feasibility as a guiding factor.

Let It Be: Why Critters Need Winter Gardens

As the growing season ends, it may be tempting to cut back dead plants and clear garden beds. However, leaving some vegetation standing through winter plays an important role in supporting local ecosystems.

When you let stems, seed heads, and leaves stay put through the cold months, you're creating essential winter habitat. Many insects hibernate inside hollow plant stems or under leaf litter. Birds rely on leftover seeds from coneflowers, sunflowers, and grasses when other food is scarce.

How You Can Help:

1. Leave plant stalks.
2. Pile leaves in your garden to insulate soil and offer cover.
3. Wait to clean up until spring temperatures are consistently above 50°F.



SAV Historical Society


Our article about early schools in St. Anthony, and our subsequent Facebook post, stimulated a brief online conversation about two tragic early deaths with Joyce Jackson of Perry, Maine and her husband Patrick Mealey. Online and by phone, they shared his memories growing up in St. Anthony including the following stories:

The first story from the "History of Hennepin County, 1881" describes the demise one of our earliest residents, Lewis C. Timson who with his brother-in-law, Nathan O. Phillips in "the fall of 1850... made claims on the northwest quarter of section 6 ... Mr. Timson[sic] joined the army in 1862. He was a prisoner at Andersonville, and died of ill treatment received there. He was exchanged, but his death occurred before he could reach the Union lines. Mr. Timson is the only known casualty of the Civil War who was a resident of St. Anthony.

 The second story is from the Minneapolis Morning Tribune, March 10, 1910 reports "Small Boy Shoots Chum." 'Let me shoot first' was the entreaty of 14 year-old Alexander McInnis to his playmate, Donald Milliam, 13 years old, while hunting in New Brighton Tuesday. With those words the lad stepped in front of his chum, as the latter pulled the trigger of his rifle. McInnis died at the Swedish hospital Wednesday as a result of the 22 caliber bullet which pierced his abdomen... Dr A. E. Johnson, who was called

caused the removal of the boy to the hospital where he died ... after completely exonerating his friend from all blame." He is buried at the St. Anthony Cemetery. His father was a truck gardener, a respected and active member in the community since the mid 1880s as a school board member and township officer. Their homestead on Stinson Boulevard is one of few existing original homes left in the Village.
