Notes from the Mayor

Dear Residents,

When I was attending officer training in the Army as a young man, we were instructed on the Leadership Reaction Course to do something! As inaction gives the initiative to the opponent and therefore you lose the opportunity to seize the advantage. This is certainly an attribute that our public safety personnel must adopt along with their standard operating procedures, training and experience. However that which works well in times of emergencies may not be the best approach in deliberative governance, home or business life.

We all are constantly receiving new information as time passes, however we must at some point make a decision even in the absence of a perfect data set of knowledge. Not to do so lead a lot of people and organizations to analysis paralysis and consequently events' results are determined for them. That may not be the most appropriate or effective decision making process and it ultimately diminishes your ability to control your destiny or desired outcomes. In my decision making process I “reserve the right to change my mind” as new data is illuminated. Not to do so would make one rigid and dogmatic in their thinking.

We have all heard the phrase the need to “justify one's purchases” which is not very flattering in the context of good stewardship of one's resources. As we look to sustainability in our lives, community and for our successors we must be flexible in our willingness to give a fair hearing to other possibilities or we may be trapped in a false set of realities according to past information.

Over the years, we have all met people that we are not always in agreement with, or that we even try to understand their position. But as we learn to listen respectfully, we will be able to hear their views and insights and even though we may have not come to the point of agreeing, we gain mutual respect and we can move forward on the issues we can undertake together with a renewed vigor and sense of purpose. All of us have friends that we have disagreeable views with on various issues but nonetheless remain friends in a cordial and respectful manner. And even on some occasions opposing thoughts have adjusted view points. However that will only happen when we open our minds to the possibilities of change and leave the entrenchment we have so well established.

ORGANIZED SOLID WASTE COLLECTION by Mark Casey, City Manager

City of Saint Anthony staff has been directed by the City Council to explore organized collection of residential solid waste. This initiative to start a plan for organized collection has been a long standing objective of the City Council as part of the City's goal of building and cultivating environmental responsibility.

Pursuant to the Minnesota Organized Collection Statute, M.S. 115A.94 ("Statute"), the recently amended process begins with a 60-day negotiation period exclusively with the existing residential refuse collectors to develop a proposal for the collection of trash and recyclables. As required under the Statute, such meetings and negotiations are exclusive. The 60-day negotiation period will conclude on June 29th, 2014.

The City of Saint Anthony Village will use the following priorities (alphabetical order) as the basis for negotiating and developing a proposal with licensed residential collectors. These priorities may also be considered by an organized collection options committee, if established, for future evaluations of organized collection options, alternative collection methods and structures, and other implementation decisions about trash and recycling collection system improvements.

1. Allocate Adequate Staff Resources
2. Assure All Residents Have Adequate Trash and Recycling Services
3. Enhance Coordination Among Government Agencies
4. Enhance Public Education and Awareness
5. Improve Hauler Reporting Systems
6. Improve Recycling, Composting and Waste Reduction
7. Improve Safety
8. Improve Standardization of Service Options
9. Improve Value of Services
10. Increase Use of Resource Recovery Facilities
11. Lessen Environmental Impacts
12. Minimize Disruption to Residents
13. Minimize Impacts on Licensed Solid Waste Collectors
14. Optimize Administrative Efficiency
15. Promote Local Economic Development
16. Reduce Road Wear Impacts



There will be opportunity for public input upon the conclusion of the 60-day negotiations. No final decisions will be made by the City Council until after a formal public hearing. We will continue to post information on the City's website as it becomes available.

On the primary ballot residents will have the opportunity to vote on the following races:

- United States Senator
- Governor and Lieutenant Governor
- Secretary of State
- State Auditor
- Attorney General

Sample ballots are available on St. Anthony's website under Hot Topics. Remember when voting in the Primary Election, you need to vote within party lines.

VOTER ELIGIBILITY

You may register to vote in Minnesota if you are:

- 18 years of age or older;
- Citizen of the United States; and
- Have resided in Minnesota for 20 days immediately preceding Election Day, and maintain residence at the address given on the registration form;
- Have any felony conviction record discharged, expired or completed;
- Are NOT under court-ordered guardianship where a court has revoked your voting rights; and
- Have NOT been ruled legally incompetent by a court of law.

REGISTERING TO VOTE

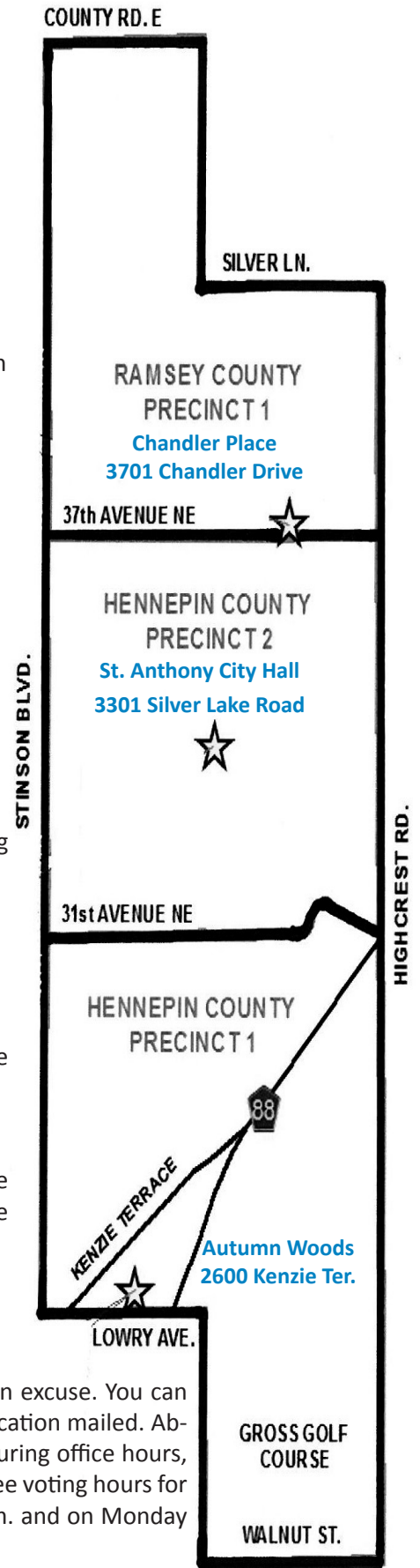
Unregistered residents are encouraged to pre-register to vote. Pre-registration must be completed at least 20 days prior to an election. You can register to vote on-line at: <https://mnvotes.sos.state.mn.us> under voter registration.

If you need to register on Election Day be sure to bring proper identification to provide proof of residence. A complete listing of proper Election Day credentials are listed on the St. Anthony website at www.ci.saint-anthony.mn.us under Register to vote.

ABSENTEE VOTING

Absentee voting for the Primary Election will also be taking place at St. Anthony City Hall during office hours, Monday - Thursday 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Friday 8:00 a.m. to noon. Extended absentee voting hours for the Primary Election will be available on Saturday, August 9, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and on Monday August 11, from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

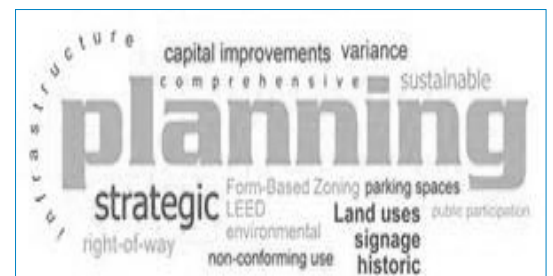

One of the fundamental responsibilities of local government is planning and the preparation of plans. Planning involves describing how a community shapes and guides growth, development, and redevelopment. This process is often referred to as “city planning”, “urban planning”, or sometimes “land use planning”. Just as veterinarians need to be able to work with circulation, digestion, respiration, the skeleton, and nervous system of an animal, planners need to work with the transportation system, the economy, the environment, urban design and physical facilities, and culture and politics of a city to maintain the quality of life.

Effective planning ensures that future development and/or redevelopment occurs where, when and how the community and local government wants. There are several important benefits to the entire community that result from the planning process including, but not limited to:

- Quality of life is maintained and improved;
- A vision is clearly stated and shared by all, that describes the future of the community;
- Economic development is supported and encouraged;
- Private property rights are protected; and
- There is more certainty about where the development/redevelopment will occur, what it will be like, approximately when it will happen, and how the costs of development/redevelopment will be met.

CODE ENFORCEMENT CORNER

Garbage Containers

All garbage and recycling containers need to be stored out of public view except the evening before and the day of collection. If this is a problem, you need to install screening to block the site of the containers from the street.

Parking

Parking ordinances for boats, RV's and cars within St. Anthony are as follows:

- * Park all vehicles on a paved surface. Don't park your vehicle on the grass at anytime.
- * Be sure all vehicles have a current state registration; otherwise, park the vehicle in the garage or other building. This also applies for expired license tabs on vehicles.
- * A motor vehicle that remains for more than a 48 hour period on public property is considered abandoned and can be ticketed.
- * Travel trailers, campers and other recreational vehicles can't be parked in any zoning district for use as a dwelling.

Tree Trimming or Removal

All contractor's performing tree trimming or tree removal services must be licensed by the City of St. Anthony. Contact our License Specialist at 612-782-3317 to confirm your contractor is licensed.

Also, remember you don't want to obstruct the view of the streets and private property when parking in residentially-zoned property.

Put Your Food Scraps to Work

Bring your food waste and non-recyclable paper to six of the Ramsey County yard waste sites (does not include the site in Arden Hills). Ramsey County will haul it to an organics composting site, where it will become a soil amendment.

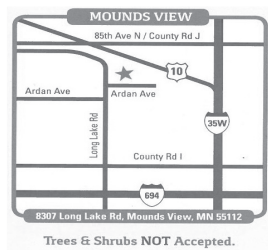
Drop-off Locations: All Ramsey County Yard Waste sites, EXCEPT ARDEN HILLS. Closest drop off site to St. Anthony is the **Mounds-view** location.

How to Use:

1. Pick up FREE compostable bags at the six yard waste sites that collect organic waste or contact City Hall.
2. Fill the bags with food waste and other material listed below.
3. Bring your bagged organics to a Ramsey County yard waste site.
4. Put your bagged organics in the designated container.
5. If you need more compostable bags, ask a yard waste monitor.
*Keep food waste separate from yard waste

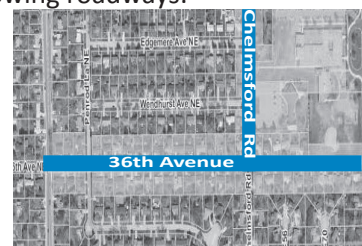

CITY COUNCIL APPROVES 2015 STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FEASIBILITY STUDY

The proposed 2015 Street and Utility Improvement Project include reconstructing the following roadways:

- * 36th Avenue NE from Silver Lake Rd to Highcrest Rd NE
- * Chelmsford Rd from 36th Avenue to 37th Avenue NE



Proposed utility improvements include replacement of sanitary sewer, water main, private service connections to the right-of-way, fire hydrants, water valves, and construction of new storm sewer facilities. The City will also be looking at improvements to alleys and the overlay of St. Anthony Blvd. east of the bridge over the Northeast Diagonal Trail to the city border.

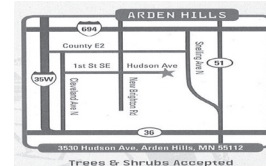


YARD WASTE DISPOSAL SITES

BE PREPARED! by Mark Sitarz, Fire Chief

I met with a young member of the community recently who is going for a merit badge in the Boy Scouts. He asked me various questions pertaining to different situations that the Fire Department may face and how would we deal with them. After our discussion we chatted about our training and how being prepared can make a difficult situation a lot easier to deal with.

Last year the storms that we experienced were not something new. Depending on the forecast, we know that we need to make sure the gutters are clean, the downspouts are on and patio furniture is secured. We prepare for what we are familiar with. We prepare for what we have experienced in the past. Where things fell short for people was the absence of preparation for a multi-day event; because it never happens.

When it comes to being prepared for a severe weather event, there are a number of things that people need to pay attention to. Here is the information from the Red Cross to give you some ideas on putting a kit together to help you prepare for a weather event.

Food:

Buy a three day emergency food supply for your household. Use the **BUS** rule to help you out.

Balance- A balanced diet which includes high energy foods to comfort food. Having both ends of the spectrum can help everybody get through things a lot easier. This is especially helpful for people with certain health conditions or dietary needs.

Usability- Canned or dried meat, cereal and canned vegetables. Items that don't need to be cooled, heated or required a lot of water. Also make sure you have a manual can opener.

Shelf Life- Pay attention to expiration dates and replace as needed.

Power Outage:

Keep a vehicle charger in your car so you can recharge your cell phone(s). Keeping that communication option available is extremely important. If you have a landline remember that a cordless phone won't work but the old wall phone with a cord to the handset will. Wrap your fridge and freezer in blankets if a power outage occurs. Keep vents clear in case power returns. Know where you can buy dry ice in the area to use in your fridge and freezer. Remember that this will be a popular item if there is a widespread power outage.

Medicines:

Ibuprofen, antibiotic creams and even some alcohol wipes. If you take medications, get a copy of your records and ask your doctor about a backup supply as a possibility. Walking down to the Pharmacy may not be an option as they may not be open.

Unique Family Needs:

Whether you have an infant, a diabetic, require oxygen, have a disability or have a pet(s), determine your unique needs, then consider and plan for them. Pets will need water, food and any specific medications. Keep in mind that most emergency shelters will not allow pets so you will have to consider that when you need to find a place for them. Make sure you have a copy of their vaccination records.

Water:

Have enough water on-hand for your family to last 3 days (72 hours). This is around 3 gallons per person. If you buy commercially bottled water, it should be replaced once a year.

Documents:

Insurance policies, medical information, emergency contacts and any other important information you feel you may need. Store them in a waterproof container that is easy to grab.

What I listed above are some basic things to think about when there is some type of major event. Keep in mind that what is easy for you to do today may not be easy or possible during a storm or event. The insert from the Red Cross will also give you some ideas on putting a kit together to help you prepare for a weather event. Putting some time and energy into preparing for an emergency situation can make a world of difference for you and your family. So follow the Boy Scout Motto and BE PREPARED, you will be glad you did.

ST. ANTHONY VILLAGE AWARDED A HIGHWAY SAFETY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM GRANT

The Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) is a competitive federal grant program established to improve safety on America's roads. The City applied for and has been awarded \$693,000 with a local 10% match of approximately \$77,000 for a total project of \$770,000. This grant has been awarded to the City to address eight signals with countdown timers, improve pedestrian refuge areas at intersections, include audio cues at intersections, and provide four segments of sidewalk within the City.

We anticipate that the City may find additional matching funds from Hennepin County and Ramsey County for the proposed signal upgrades and sidewalk improvements. Both Counties have previously offered assistance to upgrade these signals. City staff will be meeting with the Counties to quantify the amount of funding requested and to assist in defining the project components to be implemented. More details will be provided in open houses, City Council meetings and the fall newsletter.

RICE CREEK WATERSHED DISTRICT RECEIVES TARGETED WATERSHED MANAGEMENT GRANT

The Minnesota Board of Water Resources made available \$5 million in grant money for the implementation of Targeted Watershed Management Programs. These funds were set aside to accelerate water quality improvements within targeted watersheds within the state of Minnesota. Of the available \$5 million, the Rice Creek Watershed District has received a \$3 million grant for the areas tributary to Pike Lake and Long Lake.

The proposed projects funded by this grant include two improvements that were recommended in the 2011 Flood Analysis for the Cities of St. Anthony Village and the City of New Brighton. These improvements are part of larger approach to resolving flood issues in the Ramsey County Ditch 2, 3 and 5 watersheds, and to improve the quality of storm water being discharged downstream into the impaired waters of Pike and Long Lakes in the City of New Brighton.

The two projects proposed to be completed in this grant program include:

1. Improvements to Hansen Park in New Brighton. These improvements will accommodate stormwater flows from St. Anthony and Roseville, increase the stormwater storage capacity in Hansen Park, and reduce the pollutants discharged to Pike and Long Lakes.
2. Improvements to Mirror Lake in St. Anthony Village. These improvements include dredging the lake to improve water quality; construction of a new outlet to provide additional flood storage, reduce peak stormwater discharge rates to the low point of Foss Road near the Mirror Lake condominiums, and to improve water quality to Pike and Long Lakes.

This grant also includes water quality benefits associated with the restoration and stabilization of stream banks on Rice Creek near the Twin Cities Army Ammunition Plant; and a program aimed at managing carp within Rice Creek and its tributary lakes.

Design of these projects will include opportunities for public input and participation. The exact schedule for design and construction has not been set as of this newsletter publication.

PURSUING GRANTS RESULTS IN LEVERAGING TAX DOLLARS by Shelly Rueckert, Finance Director

Each year, all City departments research, apply for and manage numerous grants from Federal, State and Local governments along with private and not-for-profit sources. These grants provide funding for City projects, equipment purchases and special initiatives, relieving the burden on local taxpayers. Since 1998, the City has been awarded over \$17 Million in various grants.

There are various types of grants that the City pursues and each has unique requirements:

- **Fully-funded** – No use of local tax dollars.
- **Mandatory City match** – There is a percentage share of program costs that the City is required to contribute.
- **In-kind contribution** – Services provided to the City by another agency at no cost to City. City's match done in the form of administrative support or other program related support.
- **Reimbursement** – The City incurs costs and then applies for full or partial reimbursement from the funding agency.

An example of a fully fund grant would be the Police Department's participation in the Ramsey County Safe & Sober program. This is a reoccurring program that has awarded over \$20,000 annually for enhanced DWI enforcement. In addition to DWI enforcement, the program has supported seat belt check, high visibility and speed control efforts. The Fire Department has procured numerous grants over the years for training and equipment such as pagers and radios. Recently, the Fire department received a Federal matching grant which supported 95% of the cost to acquire a Jaws of Life Device and Turn-out gear for 22 firefighters.

The Public Works Department receives grant funds for on-going safety training along with matching and fully funded grants for specific construction projects. Over the past five years, the street improvement program has benefited from Metropolitan Council Environmental Services reimbursement grants which will offset as much as 50% of the costs associated with replacing sanitary sewer lines. In 2013, the City was awarded a \$1,209,000 grant to construct an underground stormwater treatment system. This device will improve the quality of stormwater runoff conveyed from St. Anthony to the Mississippi River. The Liquor Operations have also participated by receiving awards from the Minnesota Municipal Beverage Association.

Not all grants are associated with planned programs or projects. Grants are also available to deal with disaster events such as last summer's June storms. Storms such as these require Police, Fire and Public Works Department overtime during the event to ensure public safety. Additionally, the Public Works and Parks Departments spent the following 3-4 weeks focusing on storm clean-up. Subsequent to the storm, the City participated with other local jurisdictions in gathering cost estimates to qualify for disaster relief. Once the disaster declaration was made, the Finance Department's role in the grant process was the identification of eligible costs, tracking of costs and project status, submitting properly documented reimbursement requests, following-up on collections, and working with the agencies auditors to ensure compliance. By the collective efforts of all these City Departments, the City was able to recover over \$75,000 in storm related expenditures. See illustration of grant process below:

CITIZENS FOR SUSTAINABILITY was formed in January 2013 by a group of northeast area citizens interested in creating a resilient, sustainable community, in close collaboration with the city's administration. The organization has continued adding new members and expanding its outreach, within the northeast metro area and beyond.



A weekly e-newsletter—CFS News-Views Digest—provides an overview of information related to sustainability issues. Monthly Saturday forums provide opportunities to hear presentations by experts, discuss relevant topics, and provide meeting time for action teams.

Four action teams are working on several initiatives:

The Land-Food Team, coordinated by Pat LeFebvre, is sponsoring a Growing Groceries Program, consisting of three workshops taught by three UM Master Gardeners—Dawn Pape, Lynette Thompson, and Patrick Fischer. 30 citizen gardeners have participated in the first two workshops, and the third workshop is scheduled for Sept. 20. The team's main goal is to create more local food awareness and activity, including the ultimate formation of community and educational gardens. Amy Fields, manager of Eastside Food Co-op, will serve as forum speaker on July 12. Her topic will be "Promoting Healthy Local Food Sources".

The Energy-Resources Team, coordinated by Mary Friend, has been working on recycling issues, including collecting recyclable materials at the annual SAV Village Fest, for the first time last summer. Other projects include supporting single-hauler waste removal, exploring composting possibilities, and promoting solar energy within the city.

The Mobility-Transportation Team, coordinated by Kara Garbe Balcerzak, has been working on increasing and improving bikeways and walkways in the area, in addition to encouraging more bike racks and bus shelters for high-use locations. The team will also sponsor a bike-and-walk ride in the Village Fest Parade Aug. 1.

The Education-Communication Team, coordinated by Clif Ware, is responsible for managing the weekly e-newsletter, all forum presentations, and media publicity. The newest project—a Sustainability Book Club—will begin meeting June 14, 1:30-2:30 p.m., in the SAV City Hall Council Chambers, preceding the June forum, 3-5 p.m. The book to be discussed is "Plato's Revenge: Politics in the Age of Ecology", by William Ophuls.
