Note from the Mayor

Dear Residents,

I was recently watching the national news and at the end of the broadcast a woman who was a survivor of the WWII concentration camps was singing the National Anthem at a baseball game - it was her lifelong dream. There have been better renditions of that awe inspiring song but none with more sincerity, affection and passion exuded by this grateful American to her adopted country.

It started me to thinking of how many of us live on the legacy of someone else. Are we committing to the future of our nation, state, community and family or are we living off the virtuous efforts of others before us?

Then I read an article on how wealth managers are talking to families that inherited wealth from parents and grandparents and doing a genealogy “show and tell” about how their fore bearers acquired the money and the difficulties they endured to accumulate that fortune. The intent is to educate the heirs on their responsibility and legacy as history has shown that after 3 generations it is mostly dissipated. We will continue to explore these and other options and position ourselves to capture innovative approaches so we don’t live on someone else’s legacy.

I am enthusiastic to be the City’s advocate in the continuation of our sustainability legacy. Even more than that I have the fortunate opportunity to live here surrounded by respectful and thoughtful residents.

WATER TREATMENT PLANT UPDATE

The City of St. Anthony Village continues to make progress on the design and construction of the new water treatment process to remove 1,4 Dioxane from the City's water supply. The City of St. Anthony Village is committed to providing safe and reliable drinking water.

The water treatment upgrade project is currently in final design. Construction will begin in the Fall of 2016. Through the diligent work of our City staff and Engineer, we are confident this addition to our existing water treatment facility will allow us to continue to provide safe and reliable drinking water. We expect the work to be completed by the Summer of 2017.

The City continues to monitor the water supply to ensure that the water delivered to your home or business is safe to drink. To date, the level of 1,4 Dioxane in our water has not exceeded the 1 part per billion health advisory level established by the Department of Health.

In addition to the planned improvements to the treatment plant, the City of St. Anthony Village has completed upgrades to the City's wells. These upgrades allow the City to blend water from different wells to ensure that the water we deliver does not exceed the recommended limits of 1,4 Dioxane.

SUSTAINABLE CITY AWARD

Saint Anthony Village is the second city to ever be recognized as a Sustainable City by the League of Minnesota Cities (LMC).

ELECTION JUDGES NEEDED

Help us provide excellent customer service to voters! At least 500 new election judges are needed in Saint Paul and its suburbs to accommodate the high anticipated turnout in the 2016 General Election.

If you are ...

- A U.S. citizen eligible to vote in Minnesota (not necessarily a Ramsey County resident);
- Interested in helping your fellow citizens vote according to all applicable laws and rules;
- Willing to learn how to perform the duties necessary to conduct an election ...

... then you have what it takes to be an outstanding election judge!

Our best election judges are people who strongly value public service. Many polling places will have more than 1,000 voters, including hundreds of first-time voters. We need people who can give voters helpful instructions and answer their questions while treating them professionally and respectfully.

Ramsey County will provide training to help you perform your duties. New and returning election judges will need to watch an online training video. In-person training is available for people who have limited Internet access.

- 2 hours of training, 2-3 weeks before Election Day
- 15 hours on Election Day, from 6 am to 9 pm

SAINT ANTHONY VILLAGE RECEIVES GREENSTEP CITIES STEP 4


Saint Anthony Village became one of the first five cities in the state to receive the 4th Step of the GreenStep Cities program.

GreenStep Cities is a public/private partnership administered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. Step 4 requires cities to complete metrics for the current conditions in the following topics: City Buildings and Lighting; Transportation Modes and Miles; Pervious Land, Parks and Trees; Stormwater; Renewable Energy; Infrastructure for Walking and Biking; Car, Transit and Bike Options; Drinking Water; Waste Water; Climate.



Now that data is recorded for each of these metrics for 2015, the city's progress can be tracked and compared as time passes to see how the improvements and investments that were made have changed the conditions of the city's progress towards sustainability.

Following Step 4, the Pollution Control Agency will release Step 5. This final step will focus on setting goals and seeing improvements to the metrics evaluated in Step 4.

How would you like to improve the safety of your neighborhood, have a fun time with your neighbors, build community and take part in a huge statewide program?

You can do it all at this year's Minnesota Night to Unite (NTU) celebration on Tuesday, August 2nd! For residents of St. Anthony, this is an opportunity to put together a neighborhood celebration, turn on the front porch lights, gather with neighbors and friends, get to know one another, catch up on things, play some games with the kids, enjoy a few hot-off-the-grill favorites, have some ice cream, receive a visit from the Police/Fire Department and build a sense of community.

On Tuesday, August 2nd, 2016 from approximately 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm the St.

Anthony Police Department invites St. Anthony neighborhoods to join neighborhoods throughout Minnesota for this fun filled evening.

What is building community?

This is a simple but powerful method for people to improve their own and others' living conditions. At its most basic, this is neighbors working together to create positive changes in their neighborhoods; whether they're trying to reduce crime, look out for each other's property, or get involved in the community. People working together with shared understandings and expectations are what provide an atmosphere of strong community. A strong community sends a message to criminals letting them know that our neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Already involved in a neighborhood crime watch group?

NTU will help keep your group active. This is important. Neighbors who know each other and agree to watch out for suspicious behavior are a great defense against crime. If you do not have a crime watch group, NTU is a great way to get neighbors together for the first time and start building relationships. You can make your NTU event as simple or as elaborate as you like. The main point of this evening is for residents to gather as neighbors to affirm their commitment to a safe, healthy community.

Get your children involved in this event. Kids bring great energy and enthusiasm to NTU events. Get all ages busy with your NTU planning this year. Involving children and teens can have a great long-term benefit for your block.

Can my apartment complex sign up for Night to Unite?

Apartment complexes are neighborhoods, within themselves, and are encouraged to plan an event. As you plan your NTU event, try to draw in all the people you can. Everyone benefits when neighbors know each other. The connections that are made and strengthened through NTU carry far beyond this evening.

Will there be ice cream certificates?

In keeping with tradition, the St. Anthony Cub Foods Store (3930 Silver Lake Road) is again partnering with the Police Department in promoting Minnesota "Night to Unite" events. The Cub Store is providing a 5 quart pail of Kemps vanilla ice cream to each resident who hosts a party on August 2nd.

How do I register my Night to Unite Event?

Residents with questions, or who plan to host a block party on August 2nd, are asked to visit the Village of St. Anthony website: www.ci.saint-anthony.mn.us. Click on the link for MN Night to Unite and fill out the request form electronically. A validation email will be sent to your email address to complete the registration. You may also download a copy of the registration form and mail or fax it to the Police Department. Please register by Thursday, July 28th. Please fully complete the registration form and note whether you request visits from the Police Department, Fire Department and city staff. The Police Department will deliver ice cream certificates prior to Night to Unite. (Note: to be able to accommodate requests for ice cream certificates, in a timely manner, only those who sign up prior to the July 28th deadline will receive certificates). The City Public Works Department will deliver street barricades, to the host address, for those that indicate the request on the registration form. I will notify the Public Works reference barricade needs. In addition, block lists will be given to the St. Anthony Fire Department, the Mayor, City Council and City Staff.





WATER QUALITY REPORT

As required by the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act, the City of St. Anthony monitors its drinking water and is issuing the results for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2015. The purpose of this report is to advance consumers' understanding of drinking water and heighten awareness of the need to protect precious water resources.

St. Anthony is proud to report that no contaminants were detected at levels that violated state and federal drinking water standards.

The Planning Commission is a seven-person body meeting the fourth Monday evening of each month at 7PM in the City Council Chambers. Typical agenda items include: land use and development, city ordinance modifications and variance requests made by both residents and businesses. Very recently, I had an opportunity to tour the city guided by the Mayor, City Council and Staff. The narrative enabled me to better understand the origins and anticipated outcome/benefits of in-process infrastructure initiatives on the resident's quality of life and city planning - which ultimately influences the Comprehensive Plan. The "take-away" for me was responsible and innovative infrastructure engineering transforms plans into actionable initiatives. This is the year of the Comprehensive Plan, the plan defines St. Anthony's vision regarding housing, transportation, parks, water resource policy and land use in general – find your way to participate either by attending city promoted events or contacting city staff with your comments and questions.

CITY CONTINUES THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN PROCESS

The city continues with the process of updating the Comprehensive Plan. So far over 100 people have been engaged regarding what they want to preserve, enhance, and change about St. Anthony. Community engagement efforts have included a community visioning session, meeting with Parks Commission, talking to people at the SAV wine event, visiting with high school students, visiting with renters, meeting with ECFE Parent Council and online community engagement efforts.

To date, the feedback from residents has been overwhelmingly positive. People love living in the city, are proud of the schools, happy with their proximity to places to shop and eat, and think St. Anthony is peaceful and quiet. Themes regarding items to improve included: finding another use for the former Walmart space, encouraging affordable housing, looking at adult programming at the Community Center, examining the intersection of 29th Street/Silver Lake Road and Kenzie Terrace, and improving biking and walking access to key locations. TIME TO FIX THAT LEAK?

Common types of leaks found in the home include worn toilet flappers, dripping faucets and showerheads, and other leaking valves. All may be easily correctable. Repairing household water leaks can save homeowners on their water bills and help to conserve the water supply. The average leaky faucet may drip once every two seconds. At that rate, the faucet will be wasting two gallons of water per day and over a thousand gallons per year. Fixing a leaky faucet is a simple and inexpensive action that you can take to save money and conserve water. Leak repair kits are available at local home improvement stores.



ANNUAL AUDIT COMPLETE


Each year the City is audited by an independent audit firm. This year, as in past years, the City received an unqualified opinion. An unqualified opinion is commonly known as a “clean opinion”. There were no adjustments made to the City’s books and there were no legal compliance findings as well. The City maintains over 30 governmental funds tracking the City’s operating, capital improvements and debt service activities. The 2015 financial statements reflected the impact of adopting the Governmental Accounting Standards Board’s standard 68 (GASB 68). GASB 68 required the City to include in its financial statements the state pension assets, liabilities and operating activity related to its employee plans. This disclosure is important from a bond rating perspective as not all states are equal in their funding of state run pension plans. The Finance Department works diligently to ensure that the City’s annual financial statements present an accurate and complete picture of the City’s financial position. The City’s 2015 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report is available on the City’s website.



2017 STREET AND UTILITY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Staff completed the feasibility study for the 2017 Street and Utility Improvement Project. The proposed project consists of reconstructing the following roadways:

- Penrod Lane from 36th Avenue NE to Skycroft Drive NE
- Skycroft Drive from Penrod Lane to Maplewood Drive
- Chelmsford Road from 36th Avenue NE to Maplewood Drive
- Maplewood Drive from Skycroft Drive to Highcrest Road (including cul-de-sacs to the north)



Proposed utility improvements include sanitary sewer and water main replacement inclusive of services to the utility easement, replacement of all hydrants, water valves, and manholes that do not meet current City standards; as well as new storm sewer facilities.

SUMMER SAFETY REMINDER

When people think of falls they think of the winter months, when the weather is cold and the sidewalks are slippery. But in all reality, falls happen year round. Many of us don’t realize that there are multiple fall hazards present in our homes. According to the Minnesota Department of Health, falls account for almost HALF of the hospitalized injuries and are the leading cause of injuries treated in emergency departments. Below are some quick tips to keep you and your loved ones safely on their feet all year round:

- Make sure hallways and stairs are clear of debris
- Have proper fitting shoes and socks
- Socks with rubber grips to prevent slipping
- Install a grab bar in areas of the home where assistance is needed, Ex: Bathtub, Shower, Toilet, & Staircases
- Ensure your home is well lit
- Exercise to improve balance and strength

In some cases, especially the elderly, falls can cause major injury and even death. It is very important to be aware of the fall hazards around the home so you can take the necessary precaution to prevent falling and injury. You can assist the elderly and your loved ones by clearing any potential fall hazards in their home.

MIRROR LAKE PROJECT UPDATE

Several feet of nutrient rich material will be excavated from Mirror Lake to improve the quality of water being sent downstream to Long Lake in New Brighton; and to provide additional flood storage capacity in Mirror Lake.

This will reduce the impact of flood waters on homes and businesses adjacent to Mirror Lake.

The shoreline areas will be constructed with safer slopes and vegetation that benefits pollinator species, bees and butterflies. The project is funded with assistance from the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources Clean Water Legacy Funds, Rice Creek Watershed District and St. Anthony.

September 1st, the City will begin dewatering Mirror Lake. This will give many of the amphibians and turtles time to relocate to nearby ditches, ponds and streams; where they can hibernate for the winter without being disturbed by construction. Removal of trees around the Lake will also be completed this Fall.

Once the ground is frozen, excavation of the material from Mirror Lake will begin. It is anticipated that most of the work will be done between December and February. Final restoration, plantings, and seeding will be done in Spring 2017.

In the first half of the year, city staff and our GreenCorps member have been working with residents who applied to the Pollinator Pathway Program. By the end of this summer, there will be 26 new locations for pollinators (bees, butterflies, birds and other insects) to find food sources and habitat. If this is of interest to you, check the city website under Pollinators to learn how you can add habitat to your property, institution or business.

The keys to creating good habitat for wildlife are to avoid harmful chemicals, provide sources of food throughout the growing season (April-October), and incorporate a diversity of plants to please a diversity of animals.

WATER RESTRICTIONS

The City of Saint Anthony Village is committed to providing safe and reliable drinking water, and we are acting with an abundance of caution in response to the discovery of the chemical dioxane in our wells. In order to reduce the risk of dioxane reaching a level that may present health risk, we have implemented the following water restrictions until further notice:

- Restrict lawn watering to an odd/even every other day schedule.
- No watering between 11:00 am to 6:00 pm.
- Close the city's two splash pads to conserve fresh water.

We understand these measures present inconveniences and we appreciate your cooperation.

MEDICATION DROP OFF

Safely dispose of unwanted, expired and unused medications for free at Ramsey and Hennepin County public drop boxes. Safe disposal of unwanted medications helps prevent crime, drug abuse, and accidental poisoning. Not flushing medications down the drain or disposing them in the trash helps protect our environment.

PORK BELLIES FUTURES AND PORK BELLIES PAST
