2010 A Year in Review

Here is a recap of the 2010 City Council activities:

The City of St. Anthony Village held 22 Council meetings. During these meetings, the Council approved 90 resolutions and two City ordinances. The Council held 16 HRA meetings and approved seven resolutions. The Council held 6 worksessions.

Looking to 2011.....

The City of St. Anthony will be conducting their annual street improvement project. For 2011, the project consists of:

- * **Belden Drive** (from 37th Avenue NE to 36th Avenue NE)
- * **Coolidge Street** (from 37th Avenue NE to 36th Avenue NE)
- * **Harding Street** (from 37th Avenue NE to 36th Avenue NE)
- * **Edward Street** (from 37th Avenue NE to 36th Avenue NE)

The project will consist of reconstruction of the street with bituminous paving and concrete curb and gutter. Also the project includes replacing the watermain and sanitary sewer main, installation of the new storm mains and new storm sewer catch basins.

The project reconstruction will be completed, including the first lift of bituminous and all restoration items in 2011. The final lift of bituminous will be installed in June of 2012.

2010 General Election

In traditional fashion, the residents of St. Anthony came to the polls on November 2, 2010. Our precincts were busy all day long. The number of ballots cast per precinct were as follows:

Hennepin 1 ~ 1,115
 Hennepin 2 ~ 1,802
 Ramsey 1 ~ 1,200
 Total ballots cast ~4,117

The City of St. Anthony wishes to thank all the election judges who worked in the 2010 State General Election. We appreciate all their hard work and dedication during the election season. Without all of their work, this election could not run as smoothly and efficiently.

The City would also like to thank Autumn Woods and Chandler Place for allowing polling sites in their facilities. Both facilities were very accomodating and helpful on election day. The City of St. Anthony is very fortunate to have facilities such as these and appreciates the sacrifices they endured during election day.

2011 brings a Municipal Election on November 8th. Watch for more information in the upcoming newsletters.

What St. Anthony Accomplished in 2010? by City Manager Mornson

As we start planning goals and projects for 2011 and beyond, it is always good to look back and review what was accomplished in 2010.

First of all, we completed the 2010 Street Project which consisted of Silver Lane and Highcrest Road. The project on Silver Lane consisted of street and utility reconstruction as well as sidewalks and street lighting improvements. The funding for this project was share with the City of New Brighton.

The Highcrest Road consisted of bituminous mill and overlay from 33rd Avenue to 37th Avenue. This project was completed with shared funding from the City of Roseville. The project also had new bituminous mill and overlay on Old Highway 8 from Highway 88 to 33rd Avenue.

Secondly, we continued to work on the redevelopment of Silver Lake Village, with the approval of an IHOP Restaurant where the old Bakers Square was located. The City approved a new development agreement to continue to complete the remaining development in the area. The remaining development at this time may consist of a Senior Housing Co-Op as well as Senior Housing Apartment Project.

Third, the City's Water Re-Use Facility located by the tennis courts won the Governor's Award for Pollution Control. This is the fourth award this project has received. Funding for this project came from Mississippi Watershed Management Organization, Hennepin County, and Rice Creek Watershed.

Fourth, the City through hard work of City staff, received grants and donations from local businesses/residents and partnerships with other government entities totally \$156,517. Most of the grants were used to help pay for capital equipment and training needed by our Police and Fire Department.

Fifth, staff redesigned the City's web site. The design, as well as the lay-out of the website was updated. This was completed with the goal of making the website more user-friendly. The project was completed with minimal costs to the City.

Lastly, the City installed security upgrades to all city buildings. This was completed to ensure the infrastructure of St. Anthony is safe and secure.

There were more projects and activities completed in 2010 but these six were some of the larger projects. All projects listed were goals identified in our Strategic Planning Report and are part of the City Goals for the year. The six goals that the City has as we enter 2011 are as follows:

- ~ Environmental Stewardship
- ~ Improve and Maintain Housing Infrastructure
- ~ Technology Advances
- ~ Maintain/Improve Housing Stock
- ~ Generational Transitions
- ~ Strong, Sound Progressive Community

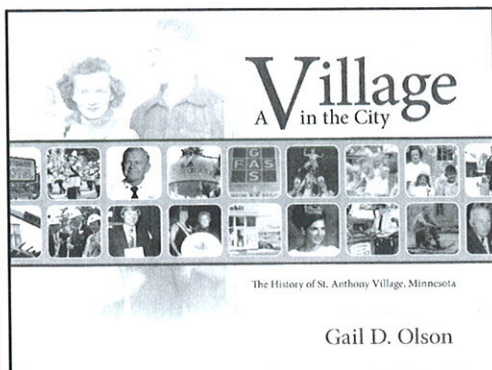

The purpose of the CC is to advise and assist the managers on all matters affecting the interests of the District and to make recommendations to the managers on all contemplated projects and improvements in the District. Members are also asked to keep current on water-related issues in their community and relay this information to the district.

ADOPT A FIRE HYDRANT

The St. Anthony Fire Department would appreciate residents' help in keeping the snow cleared away from pathways and fire hydrants. The accumulation of excess snow blocks the view of responding fire apparatus's to fire hydrant locations. Precious time is wasted when firefighters have to look for and uncover fire hydrants. Please help by occasionally shoveling around the fire hydrants, keeping them accessible in case of a fire.

WATER AND SEWER EMERGENCIES

If you have a water or sewer emergency, contact City Hall immediately at 782-3301 during normal business hours. For after hours service, contact the Fire Department at 782-3400. City crews will be dispatched to assess the situation and assist the property owner. Remember, the property owner is responsible for maintaining water or sanitary sewer service from their building up to and including the connection to the main water or sewer lines.

WINTER PARKING REMINDER

Residents are not allowed to park in ANY street for a period of 48 hours, beginning immediately after two (2) inches or more of continuous snowfall or until the snow removal has been completed curb to curb.

The Rice Creek Watershed District (RCWD) has complimentary 2011 calendars available for residents while supplies last. The calendars feature pictures taken within the Rice Creek Watershed District boundaries.

Have an idea for Improving Water Quality? Let us help!

Are clean rivers and lakes important to you? Do you have a great idea for an Earth Day event? Are you a teacher that would like to install a raingarden as a class project? Would you like to throw a block party and teach residents about water friendly yard maintenance? Do you have other ideas for projects that would improve our water resources? If so, you may be eligible for a grant to help your idea happen.

The Mississippi Watershed Management Organization's grant program can help you with your ideas to improve water quality. Mini Grants are available for amounts up to \$2,000 for smaller projects, and the application is only a few pages long. Planning Grants of up to \$10,000 may be a better fit if you have a bigger project to plan and need funding to do so. Applications for both grants are due on February 1, 2011. To see examples of projects that have been funded and to learn more about the grant program, visit: www.mwmo.org/stewardshipfund.html. The MWMO wants to help you be a part of cleaner water!

Q. Is there such a thing as an environmentally friendly way to de-ice my front walk? I've noticed pet-friendly salts and garden- and grass-friendly products, but are they all bad for the earth?

A. Shoveling your sidewalk, chipping away ice and laying off any de-icer is the best approach, but sometimes safe passage requires a little extra. While rock salt (usually sodium chloride) is amazingly effective at melting ice, it's also a highly corrosive toxin that ruins soil, contaminates groundwater and is harmful to pets.

Many animal- and garden-friendly products are actually anti-icers that contain calcium magnesium acetate (CMA), a compound that prevents ice from forming. These anti-icers are available in both liquid and granular form but require frequent use and the ability to predict the weather.

If you still feel you have to use salt, you may want to switch from sodium chloride to potassium chloride, which is less corrosive. And ensure you are not using too much; a single handful is enough for a square yard area.

Winter Driving Tips ~ St. Anthony Police Department

Winter is coming fast, and every year as Minnesotans, we “learn” to drive all over again on winter roads. Every year there seems to be a bit of a learning curve with the first snowfalls of the season. In hopes of lessening the impact of these first few snow events, the police department wanted to remind drivers of a few safety and driving tips.

Knowledge — Before leaving home, find out about the driving conditions by logging on to MN DOT / Travel Information Services, www.511mn.org/default.asp. Safe drivers know the weather, and their limits. If the weather is bad, remember, “Ice and Snow...Take it slow, or just don't go.”

Inspect — Check your vehicle's tires, wiper blades, fluids, lights, belts, and hoses. A breakdown is bad on a good day and dangerous on a bad-weather day.

Emergency Kit Supplies — Have an emergency winter kit in your car if you get stuck. A shovel, sand or ice melt, gloves, heavy winter clothing, food, candles, lighter and a blanket are just some of the items you will want to have with you. If you have a cellular phone, carry it with you to use if you get stuck or need help. A citizens band radio can be used as well to contact help.



Tires — Make sure that your tires have good tread and the air in the tires are properly inflated to the correct pressure. If using studs or chains call your local police department on when you can place them on your vehicle. Some cities and states have laws pertaining to the times that you can use them.

Gas Tank — Keep your gas tank close to full. If you get stuck the engine will be your only source of heat. Crack the window if you will be sitting with the engine running to avoid carbon monoxide asphyxiation.

Vision — Be aware of what's going on well ahead of you. Actions by other vehicles will alert you to problems more quickly, and give you that split-second of extra time to react safely. Stay attentive and reduce speed. Know what's going on around you.

Clear — Remove any snow on your vehicle's windows, lights, brake lights and signals. Make sure you can see and be seen. Clear off the entire car, not just a peephole in the windshield which is illegal. All windows should be cleared, along with your headlights, taillights and outside mirrors.

Control — When driving on ice and snow, do not use cruise control and avoid abrupt steering maneuvers. When merging into traffic, take it slow. Sudden movements can cause your vehicle to slide. Do everything slowly. Accelerate slowly, turn slowly and brake slowly. Leave plenty of distance between cars. Plan on leaving earlier to work, shopping, business meetings, etc.

Brake — Brake early, brake slowly, brake correctly, and never slam on the brakes. If you have anti-lock brakes, press the pedal down firmly and hold it. If you don't have anti-lock brakes, gently pump the pedal. Either way, give yourself plenty of room to stop.

First snow or ice — Drivers aren't prepared for winter driving and forget to take it slow. Remember to drive well below the posted speed limit and leave plenty of room between cars. Give snowplows room to work. The plows are wide and can cross the centerline or shoulder. Don't tailgate and try not to pass. If you must pass, take extreme caution and beware of the snow cloud.

Black ice — Roads that seem dry may actually be slippery — and dangerous. Take it slow when approaching intersections, off-ramps, bridges or shady areas — all are hot spots for black ice. Remember, “Ice and Snow...Take it Slow.”

WINTER/HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS from the St. Anthony Fire Department NFPA – (National Fire Protection Association)

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

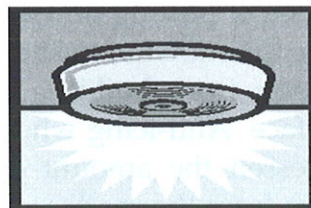


Holiday decorating

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Use lights that have the label of an independent testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three strands of mini light sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

Holiday entertaining

- Test your smoke alarms.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers.



CARBON MONOXIDE SAFETY TIPS



Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

Safety tips

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow buildup.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO – only

SALT AND SAND

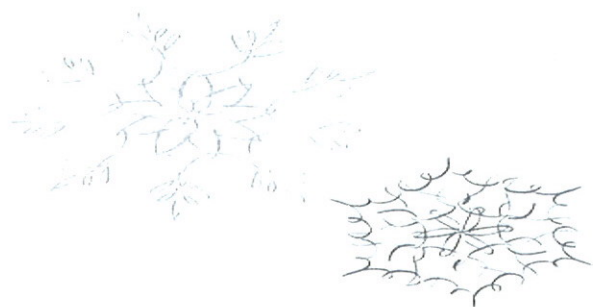
decrease its use of salt in winter maintenance. They have begun to use pre-wetting methods, liquid de-icers and anti-icing efforts to reduce the salt they use to rid the roads of slippery conditions.

Anti-icing is the process of putting down a liquid chemical before the snowfall to keep the frozen precipitation from building a bond to the road surface. Anti-icing when done correctly can lessen the amount of salt used to clear snow from the road.

Liquid de-icing is the use of such liquid chemicals as calcium chloride or magnesium chloride or salt brine to rid the roads of ice and snow. This also reduces the use of salt and is better for our environment.

The city's plow trucks have also been equipped with pre-wetting tanks, which assist the salt being dropped on the streets. The tanks provide the salt trucks to carry a liquid to assist in pre-wetting the material they use to melt the snow after plowing. By being sprayed with a salt brine solution, the salt begins the melting process quicker.

With these combined efforts, the public works department is striving to reduce the amount of salt they use by over 30% reduction.

WHAT IS ORGANIC RECYCLING?

Organics in the recycling world is defined as food scraps and food-soiled paper products and makes up about 25% of what we throw away. By collecting and recycling these “organics”, it has been found that they can be turned into very valuable compost materials that are being used in landscaping and road construction projects. Organic materials such as food waste, soft tissue plant waste and non-recyclable paper, can be broken down by bacteria in a biological process called anaerobic digestion into this compost material. And consequently, the collecting and recycling organics reduces the amount being taken to landfills or burned in an incinerator.

Because recycling organics is being collected by large cities across the nation, Hennepin County is working to make organics recycling programs an option for more county residents. Ramsey and Washington counties have also teamed up and are working together with commercial organics waste generators to provide an organic waste management system utilizing anaerobic digester and are targeting organics from food-rich commercial waste generators such as retail grocers, food processors, and institutional kitchens. There are several cities in Hennepin County that are offering curbside collection of organics collection to their trash collection service. In St. Anthony, you should contact your hauler to see if they offer or will offer in the future an organics collection to their collection services.

Is organics recycling better than using a garbage disposal? Yes it is. Recycling organic waste into compost is more cost effective and environmentally friendly than using the disposal, which takes energy to run. When these organics are flushed down the drain by the disposal, more energy and other resources are required to process out solids, including food waste, at the wastewater treatment plants.

How does organics recycling work? Organics recycling is easy.

~Collect your food scraps and food-soiled paper products. They can be collected in an ice cream bucket or kitchen scrap bucket to collect scraps in the kitchen. Collection containers can be lined with a paper bag or a compostable bag to help keep the container clean. Compostable bags and kitchen scrap buckets are available at local retailers. You can also use paper milk, juice or ice cream cartons.

~Empty your organic waste into the organics cart provided by your hauler.

~Set out your organics cart on the curb on your trash collection day.

What materials are accepted? The following organics are what is usually collected. Call your hauler to verify that these items are collected as part of their service.

Food scraps:

Fruits and vegetables
Meat, fish and bones
Bread, pasta and baked goods
Egg shells
Dairy products
Coffee grounds



Other compostable items:

Full vacuum cleaner bags
Dryer lint
Tissues and cotton balls
Floral trimmings and house plants

Food-soiled paper products:

Paper towels and napkins
Paper plates and cups
Milk and juice cartons
Pizza boxes
Egg cartons
Boxes from frozen and refrigerated foods
Waxed paper and paper containers
Coffee filters and tea bags

Will organics smell? Organics will smell the same as your household trash. Remember, it is the same waste you have now, just separated into containers. To minimize odors, remember to put in food-soiled paper products or line your container with a paper bag to absorb liquid from food waste, line your container with a compostable bag to contain liquid, empty your container frequently, and rinse it out occasionally.

Will organics recycling cost more? This is a question that you should ask your hauler if they have this curbside pick up as part of the services they provide. Depending on how your service is setup, you may actually save money, according to Hennepin County's report.

How do I make organics recycling available to my community? Hennepin County continues to work with cities and haulers to expand residential curbside collection of organics. If you would like to have an organics recycling program in your city, let your hauler know that you are interested in this service.
