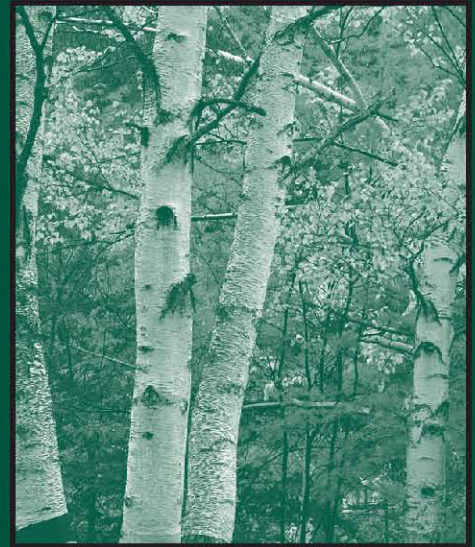

ONLY A FEW MONTHS REMAIN IN THE 2008 CONSTRUCTION SEASON!

Numerous engineering projects are currently underway in St. Anthony Village and as temperatures cool off, construction is heating up. The following is an update of the current construction activities throughout the City:

Water Meter Replacement Program and I & I Inspections

The majority of automated water meter installations and inspections have been completed throughout the City. Final notice has been given to the contractor and commercial users requiring meters to be installed within 60 days of which approximately 30 days remain.

Silver Lake Road Reconstruction

Silver Lake Road from 30th Avenue to Hilldale Avenue has been paved, and by the time this newsletter reaches you, pavement will be completed as far north as the firestation. Crews have completed installation of utilities and have begun grading the final roadway. The roadway north of the firestation to 37th Avenue is anticipated to be paved in October with sidewalk, sod and other restoration continuing into November.

Stormwater Runoff and Filter Backwash Water Reuse Facility

The construction of the 500,000 gallon underground storage tank has begun. Construction is currently on schedule for completion of the underground storage tank by October. Interior mechanical work and modifications to the Central Park irrigation system will take place in November. This new stormwater reuse facility will be completely operational for irrigation of Central Park in 2009.



2009 Street Reconstruction Project

City Council has accepted the Feasibility Report and authorized the preparation of plans for the reconstruction of Chandler Drive from 37th Avenue to Foss Road and Foss Road from Chandler Drive to the City limits. A Public Informational meeting was held on September 2, 2008 at which residents expressed their concerns with the existing roadway and offered valuable information which will be taken into consideration during the design of the new roadway. The City Council is anticipated to receive the final plans and authorize the project to be bid this fall.

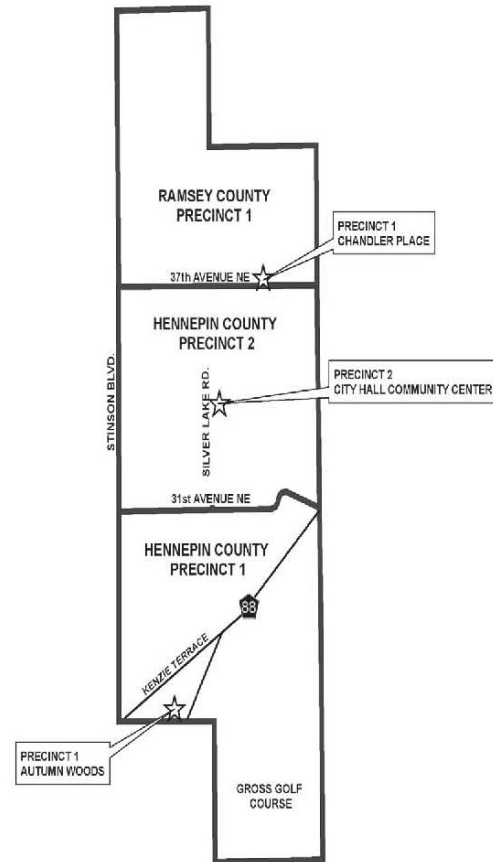

Register to Vote

New residents are encouraged to save time at the polling place by pre-registering to vote. Pre-registration must be completed at least 20 days before an upcoming election. For the general election, it is **October 14**. St. Anthony residents can complete an interactive application on the city's website at www.ci.saint-anthony.mn.us. After completion, residents can drop the application in the city's night drop box. Applications are also available at City Hall.

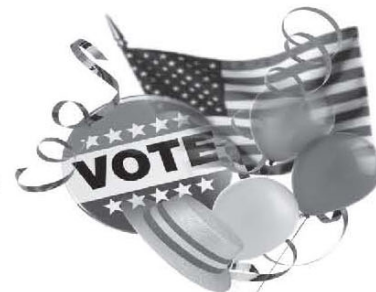
Absentee Voting Q & A

Q. I won't be able to vote in my home precinct on Election Day. What can I do?

You may vote by absentee ballot if you are going to be absent from the precinct on election, you have an illness or disability that prevents you from going to the polling place, religious discipline or observance prohibits your attendance at the polling place, or you are an election judge in another precinct.

Q. How do I obtain an absentee ballot?

Absentee ballots will be available for the General Election on **October 3, 2008**. Voters needing to vote by absentee can download an application from the city's website or come to City Hall to fill out an application. Apply early so you will have time to receive the ballot and mail it back before election day. City offices will be open on **November 1** from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and on **November 3** until 5:00 p.m. for absentee voting.



HOUSING CODE CORNER

DID YOU KNOW.....The storage of refuse and recyclable collection items may not be kept in the front yard. On trash pick-up day, please remember to remove your trash can and recycling bin from the curb and return it to the garage or some place out of site from the road.

DID YOU KNOW.....Parking in any residential district must be done on a surface paved with asphalt or bituminous material, concrete, cement, brick, or other paved surface. Please remember parking vehicles on the grass is not allowed in the City of St. Anthony.

DID YOU KNOW.....Any vehicle without a current state registration must be parked in a garage or other building. If a vehicle has expired tabs, either renew them or move the vehicle into the garage.

DID YOU KNOW.....The owner and occupant of property adjacent to a public sidewalk must use due diligence to keep the walk safe for pedestrians. All ice and snow must be removed within 12 hours after it has deposited.

DID YOU KNOW.....Before residents can have a recreational fire you must first call the St. Anthony Fire Department. You will receive a copy of the rules and review them with a member of the Fire Department. The fire department may prohibit any or all recreational fires when atmospheric conditions or local circumstances make such fires hazardous. Call 612.782-3400.

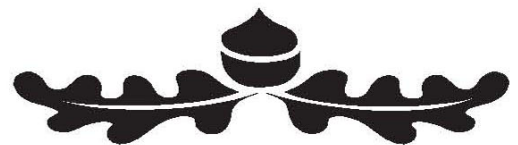

ST. ANTHONY WATER REUSE FACILITY

The City is constructing a Water Reuse Facility at the northeast corner of 33rd Avenue NE and Silver Lake Road. This innovative project will capture stormwater runoff from Silver Lake Road and water that is a by product of the City's water treatment plant process in a 500,000 gallon underground tank and 235,000 gallon pond. Captured water will be recycled and used to irrigate Central Park and City Hall property. This project will reduce the potable water used for irrigation by more than 3 million gallons annually.

The facility provides a multitude of benefits. One benefit will be a substantial reduction in the volume of stormwater runoff and pollutants discharged to Rice Creek and the Mississippi River. This reduction in pollutants will contribute toward improving the water quality of Rice Creek and the Mississippi River, and help offset runoff volumes that have historically increased due to urban development. In addition, the project will protect the City's drinking water supply by reducing groundwater consumption, provide alternative uses for stormwater and water treatment plant byproducts, and provide education opportunities to water resource professionals and the public.

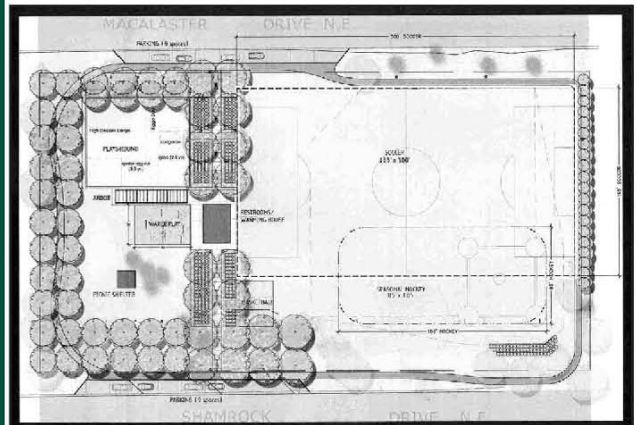
Several organizations have contributed funding to make this project possible including the Mississippi Watershed Management Organization, Rice Creek Watershed District, the City of St. Anthony, and Hennepin County. CITY COMMISSION SEAT OPPORTUNITIES

The City of St. Anthony will have two seats available on the Planning Commission beginning January 1, 2009. The Planning Commission is a paid per month governing body, which makes recommendations to the City Council on planning issues such as variances, conditional use requests, zoning issues, etc. The Commission meets on the third Tuesday of every month at 7 p.m. at St. Anthony City Hall. HYDRANT FLUSHING

Fire Hydrant flushing occurred on October 1 and October 2 between 12:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. to minimize inconvenience to residents. Flushing of the city hydrants is done for the following three reasons:

- (1) to make sure that hydrants are in good working condition;
- (2) to flush out sediment and rust deposits that accumulate in the water systems; and
- (3) to evaluate water pressures through out the City.

Thank you for your cooperation a during this process.

WATER AND SEWER EMERGENCIES

If you have a water or sewer emergency, contact city hall immediately at 782-3301 during normal business hours. For after hours service contact the fire department at 782-3400. City crews will be dispatched to assess the situation and assist the property owner. Remember, the property owner is responsible for maintaining water or sanitary sewer service from their building up to and including the connection to the main water or sewer lines.

REPORT STREET LIGHT OUTAGES

Having residents report non-functioning street lights helps St. Anthony stay out of the dark!

ADOPT A FIRE HYDRANT

The Fire Department would appreciate residents' help in keeping the snow cleared away from pathways and fire hydrants. The accumulation of excess snow blocks the view of responding fire apparatus's to fire hydrant locations. Precious time is wasted when firefighters have to look for and uncover fire hydrants. Please help by occasionally shoveling around the fire hydrants, keeping them accessible in case of a fire.

RECYCLE YOUR RAIN WATER

Rain barrels are now available at Hennepin County's Household Hazardous Waste Drop-off Facility in Brooklyn Park. The County is offering these rain barrels to Hennepin County residents for only \$62. This is the final opportunity to buy a rain barrel; they will not be sold after 2008!

The rain barrel is placed under a roof downspout to collect rain water runoff and store it for watering your lawn and gardens. Rain barrels are good for the environment because they collect the storm water that runs off from the roof, reducing the amount of drinking water used on gardens and watering grass.

Barrels are available for purchase, \$62 per barrel, (cash or check only) on Wednesdays, Thursdays, or Fridays during regular business hours while supplies last. Again, they are available only to Hennepin County residents on a first come, first served basis. Limit one barrel per household.

ABOUT SNOW PLOWING

The City's snow plowing crews' number one priority is to clear snow away to make the streets safe for traffic and emergency vehicles. Sometimes the crews' schedule for plowing does not coincide with residents' snow shoveling schedules. Please keep in mind the crews do not intentionally plow windrows of snow back onto freshly shoveled driveways or sidewalks.

Also, it is dangerous for children to dig tunnels in these windrows created by the snowplows. Tunnels can cave in, smothering the children. Plow drivers also cannot see children playing in or around the windrow. Children can be covered and trapped by these snow plow windrows.

Other ways to assist with snow removal operations include:

- * Do not place refuse or recycling containers in the street;
- * Do not plow, blow or shovel snow into the street;
- * When shoveling, pile snow downstream of the plowing operation to minimize snow left in your driveway from the plow;
- * Stay back when driving behind plow trucks.

WINTER PARKING REMINDER

Residents are not allowed to park on **ANY** city street for a period of 48 hours, beginning immediately after two (2) inches or more of continuous snow fall or until the snow removal has been completed curb to curb.

RECREATIONAL FIRES



The St. Anthony Fire Department is responsible for issuing the Recreational Fire Permits in the City. Residents wanting to have a recreational fire must first receive a copy of the rules and review them with a member of the St. Anthony Fire Department.

Procedures for having a recreational fire.

- 1) Resident must call the Fire Department, 782-3400 and obtain a verbal permit.
- 2) The fire department will document the residents address, phone number, last name and hours the fire will be held.

The fire department may prohibit any or all recreational fires when atmospheric conditions or local circumstances make such fires hazardous.

The following are rules related to recreational fires:

- * Recreational fires are allowed for food preparation;
- * Must be limited to three (3) foot in diameter and a three (3) foot high flame.
- * Only unpainted and untreated wood or charcoal may be burned.
- * Smoke must not extend beyond the property line.
- * A garden hose or adequate fire extinguisher must be on site.
- * Responsible adult must be on site until the fire is extinguished.
- * Fire must be extinguished before leaving the site.
- * Fire shall never be left unattended.
- * Ashes and coals should not be allowed to smolder.
- * Fire should be in an adequate fire ring, raised fire pit, or other approved containment system.

Home Heating Safety Tips

Heating fires have been the leading cause of fires in Minnesota for the last several years. Nearly all of the death, injury, and dollar loss could have been prevented with proper understanding and safe use of heating equipment. Safety should be your first consideration when heating your home. Here are some fireplace safety tips to remember:

If purchasing a fireplace, select one that is listed by a testing laboratory and have it installed according to manufacturers' recommendations and local codes.

- * Chimneys need to be inspected by a professional sweep prior to the start of each heating season and periodically throughout the year.
- * Chimneys need to be cleaned if there is a buildup of creosote. Creosote is a chemical substance that forms when wood burns, builds up on the chimney wall, and is highly combustible.
- * Fireplace screens should be firmly in place when burning fires.
- * Burn only clean, well-seasoned, dry

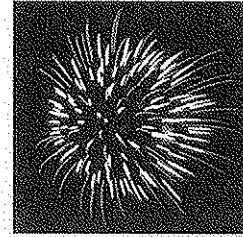

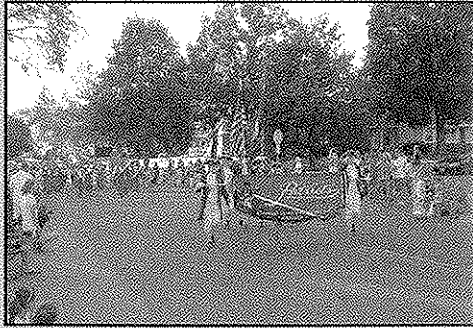

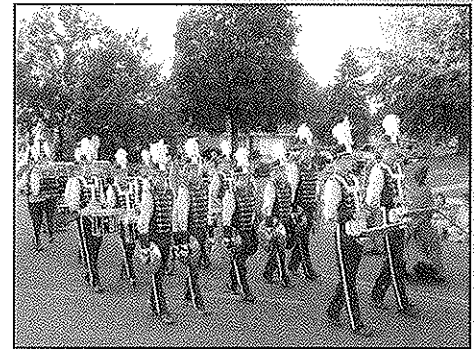
