Note from the Mayor

Dear Residents,

As I began this newsletter – it is difficult to find the right tenor to attempt to provide perspective. This has been a challenging time for our residents, city staff and the metropolitan region. But as I write this in spite of things, I see hope for us in regards to equity. Many public figures are now speaking about the need for inclusion - I see this across the nation in multiple media reports. Hennepin county's legal system is reviewing how court appearances and minor infractions are handled in terms of cost and notification. Minnesota cities are looking at best practices in policing and sharing those with each other and coming together to advance that goal. So let us find the good out of adversity and move the issue steadily yet purposely forward. See the City Manager's article on our working group formulation.

In addition, city business on other fronts continue. The Mirror Lake flooding issue that occurred in July 2011 has moved to the point of being funded and with construction beginning now for increased capacity to store more water along with better controls to manage rain events in accordance within the new rain standards (i.e. 25% greater than previous standard). These efforts should afford the residents of Mirror Lake and the adjacent business owners with a greater sense of flood mitigation security.

The Advanced Oxidation Process (AOP) plant that addresses the emerging 1.4 Dioxane plume was approved and construction beginning on the new plant. This will be connected to our existing water filtration plant and should be completed by early fall 2017. This is being funded by the United States Army and it needs to be highlighted that they are willing partners in our efforts. The Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) and the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) were of immense assistance to our staff and extremely supportive of the approach the city has taken. We need to be grateful to our capable and hardworking staff in coordination with these federal and state agencies.

Much has occurred this past quarter some within our scope of vision, some outside our scope of vision. But regardless of events, the staff has to respond to all those incidents and in many cases there is no playbook or past practices. We are a city without the luxury of redundancy in personnel positions to fill in during prolonged emergencies consequently the staff has to expend extraordinary time and effort to continue the mission of the city – that is serving all of its residents in the overall best interests of the community. That does not mean that everything is completed to everyone's satisfaction as that is impossible to accomplish. However even a small step forward is way better than a step back or the status quo – we will continue forward and not rest on our past laurels.

POLICE DEPARTMENT BODY CAMERA WORKGROUP

T

he City of St. Anthony is taking applications from St. Anthony residents who wish to serve on the newly established work group for the St. Anthony Police Department on policies for body worn cameras. An application may be obtained by visiting the City's website at www.ci.saint-anthony.mn.us or available at City Hall.

The last day to submit your application is Monday, October 17, 2016. The City Council will review all applications and a selected number of applicants will be interviewed by the City Council on Wednesday, November 2, 2016. Each respective city council will appoint three residents from their community.

The work group's purpose will be to review current police policies and protocols, best practices and trends, policy development and present policy recommendations to Police Chief, City Manager and St. Anthony City Council for officer worn cameras.

The work group will be comprised of residents of St. Anthony, Falcon Heights and Lauderdale, staff, and City Council liaisons from St. Anthony, Falcon Heights and Lauderdale. Dates and times of the work group meetings have yet to be determined. We anticipate the meetings will be on weekday evenings.

ADOPT A FIRE HYDRANT

The St. Anthony Fire Department appreciates residents who help keep the snow cleared away from pathways and fire hydrants. Accumulation of excess snow can block the view of responding fire personnel to fire hydrant locations. Precious time is lost when firefighters have to look for and uncover fire hydrants. Occasionally shoveling around the fire hydrants keeps them accessible for firefighters in case of a fire. Thank you for your assistance in making St. Anthony a safer community!

Before leaving St. Anthony for a warmer climate, contact the St. Anthony Police Department at 612-782-3350 and the Utility Billing Department at 612-782-3318.

WATER & SEWER EMERGENCIES

If you have a water or sewer emergency, contact City Hall immediately at 612-782-3301 during normal business hours. After business hours, contact the Fire Department at 612-782-3400. City crews will be dispatched to evaluate the situation and assist the property owner. Remember, the property owner is responsible for maintaining water or sanitary sewer service from their building up to and including the connection to the water main and sewer lines.

ENGINEERING UPDATES

2017 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The proposed 2017 Street and Utility Improvements Project consist of reconstructing the following roadways:

- Penrod Lane from 36th Avenue to Skycroft Drive
- Skycroft Drive from Penrod Lane to Maplewood Drive
- Chelmsford Road from 36th Avenue to Maplewood Drive
- Maplewood Drive from Skycroft Drive to Highcrest Road (including cul-de-sacs to the north)



Proposed utility improvements include sanitary sewer and water main replacement inclusive of services to the utility easement, replacement of all hydrants, water valves, and manholes that do not meet current City standards; as well as new storm sewer facilities.

2016 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The Contractor has substantially completed street and utility improvements, including bituminous base paving. Restoration and clean-up will continue this fall and the contractor will return in the spring to complete final turf establishment and place the final layer of asphalt pavement.

Mirror Lake Improvements


Mirror Lake was drained last month to allow many of the frogs, toads and turtles to relocate to new homes for their winter hibernation. The contractor is expected to begin removing trees and shrubs from around Mirror Lake later in the fall or early winter. The exact date is not yet known.

Once the pond bottom freezes this winter, the Contractor will begin excavating the years of accumulated sediment and pollutants from the pond. This will improve the quality of water in Mirror Lake and reduce

the pollutants (mainly nutrients like Phosphorus) that currently leave the Lake and flow downstream to Pike and Long Lakes in the City of New Brighton. These improvements in Mirror Lake will help improve the water quality of these lakes, Rice Creek and the Mississippi River.

Mirror Lake will also have a normal water elevation 2-feet lower than before the project, allowing an increase in the volume of flood water that can be stored in the lake during significant rain events. This will improve the flood protection to adjacent and downstream

Also, proposed for improvement in 2017 is the bituminous mill and overlay along Silver Lake Court from Silver Lane to the cul-de-sac (illustrated below).



properties. Final shoreline restoration with native pollinator species will occur in the spring of 2017.

The project is being funded with contributions from a Clean Water Legacy Grant, Rice Creek Watershed District and the City of St. Anthony.



ENGINEERING UPDATES

Advanced Oxidation Process Water Treatment Plant Expansion

The City of St. Anthony awarded the construction contract for the Advanced Oxidation Process (AOP) water treatment plant expansion to Gridor Construction at the September 13th, Council Meeting. This plant expansion is being built to remove 1, 4 Dioxane from the City's water system.



The likely source of this pollutant is the Twin Cities Army Ammunition Plant. Since discovering very low levels of this pollutant in the spring of 2015, the City has been working together with the Minnesota Department of Health and the United States Army to develop the AOP solution. The AOP treatment process provides assurance to residents that the City will continue to deliver high quality drinking water that exceeds all current health standards to their homes and businesses.

Construction started in September and will continue through the summer of 2017. The AOP expansion is located on the site of the former basketball court at Water Tower Park, and is anticipated to be fully on-line and operational by August next year.

HELP KEEP OUR WATER BODIES CLEAN

Did you know storm drains are connected directly to our rivers, lakes, and streams? Debris in the street is collected in these drains and deposited in our water bodies. An important management step we can take to protect our surface waters is to prevent turf grass clippings and leaves from entering the storm water drainage system. Loose turf grass clippings and leaves left on hard surfaces like sidewalks and streets will wash into the storm drains and are then deposited into our water bodies. Turf grass clippings and leaves contain phosphorous, which promote algae growth

making our rivers, lakes, and streams green and scummy. Here are a few things you can do to help keep our water bodies clean.



- Direct clippings away from hard surfaces. If clippings are left on hard surfaces, rain will wash them into the storm drain and they will flow into our water bodies.
- Clean up clippings that land on hard surfaces. Sweep or blow them back onto the turf, collect for composting, or bag and dispose of in designated yard waste receptacles.
- Leave clippings on the turf. Grass clippings left on the turf will break down and act as a round of fertilizer, promoting thick and healthy growth.
- Rake or mulch leaves: Leaves that are left to blow through the City may end up in storm drains and are then deposited into our water bodies.

LAND LINE OR CELL PHONE, WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Well it's that time of year again, the kids are back in school and many of them are home alone for periods of time prior to our arrival from work. If there is an emergency at home, is there a cell phone available or do you have an old fashioned phone that plugs into the wall?

With today's ever changing technology and phones that are essentially computers, many of us have decided to do away with our land line and use our cell phone as our primary means of communication. Is this the best option?

A cell phone is a great device and is very handy to have with us at all times. Is it the best way to call 911? When dialing 911 from a cell phone you are not guaranteed to reach the Hennepin County Dispatch Center. Your

connection to a dispatch center lies solely on which cell tower you reach and where it decides to route your call. In the City of St. Anthony, it is possible to reach one of four dispatch centers, Hennepin County, Anoka County, Ramsey County or Minneapolis. Once you reach the dispatch center, they do not know what address you are calling from and they will need to know which dispatch center to connect you to. If you live in St. Anthony, you need to reach Hennepin County Dispatch. Once you make contact with them you will need to tell them your address and then the nature of your problem. If there is a babysitter or nanny at home, do they know your address? If you are unable to talk, it will be difficult for dispatch to know where you are other than some coordinates and a general area. This is problematic for first

responders as there are many houses within a certain radius of the coordinates. If the power is out and your cell phone is low on battery power, you may not be able to charge it.

A land line is much more simple. When you dial 911, it goes directly to Hennepin County Dispatch and gives them your exact address. If your power goes out, the telephone line should still work unless your lines get pulled away from your house by a falling tree branch. If someone unfamiliar with your address is at your home or if you are unable to speak, dispatch will be able to advise first responders where to go.

Though it costs a little extra money each month, a landline is a very beneficial home safety device.

WINTER PARKING AND SNOW PLOWING

During the winter, the number one priority of the Public Works Department is to clear the snow and make St. Anthony's streets safe for traffic and emergency vehicles. Here are a few reminders to assist residents in achieving this goal:

Residents are NOT allowed to park on ANY street for a period of 48 hours, beginning immediately after two (2) inches or more of continuous snow fall or until the snow removal has been completed from curb to curb.

The City understands that sometimes the schedule for snow removal doesn't correlate with residents' snow shoveling schedules. The snow plow drivers do their best to avoid pushing windrows of snow back onto freshly shoveled driveways or sidewalks.

Remember it is dangerous for children to dig tunnels

in the windrows of snow created by the snow plows. Tunnels can cave in, smothering the child. Plow drivers can't see children playing in or around the windrows and they can be covered or trapped in the snow.

Other ways to assist with snow removal operations include:

- *Don't place refuse or recycling containers in the street; and

- *Don't plow, blow or shovel snow into the street; and

- *When shoveling, pile snow downstream of the plowing operations to minimize snow left in your driveway; and

- *Stay back when driving behind plow trucks.

With your cooperation, snow removal can be more efficient and roads cleared in very little time. DON'T WAIT CHECK THE DATE

Fire Prevention week is upon us once again. Each year the National Fire Prevention Association releases a campaign; a campaign to initiate conversation and learning for all age levels. This year's theme is "Don't Wait-Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years".

Now, I know what you are probably thinking, wasn't last year's theme regarding smoke alarms? You are right! In fact, this year's theme rounds out NFPA's 3 year effort to educate the public about the importance of smoke alarms. NFPA conducted a survey and found that the public has many misconceptions about smoke alarms. For example, only a small percentage of people know how old their smoke alarms are or how often they need to be replaced.

This year's theme has some pointers on helping to keep your smoke detectors in working condition:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home.
- Finding the date of your smoke alarm is easy. Simply by looking on the back of your alarm. If it's older than 10 years from that date listed then you should replace it.
- When you install your new smoke alarm make sure to write the date on the back of it so that you don't have to search for it next time.

RAIN, RAIN GO.....

“A way” as the classic rhyme goes, but that resulting stormwater is another story. The proper management of stormwater is an important element in keeping our lake and river environments healthy. Therefore the City has been actively managing the collection, storage and discharge of stormwater for decades. Technologies to improve the water quality of the discharged stormwater have evolved. The City has embraced the use of these new technologies. The maintenance of these systems is funded by quarterly stormwater charges. The 2015 biennial League of Minnesota Cities survey of quarterly stormwater charges for single family homes within Hennepin and Ramsey County’s determined an average charge per household of \$14.20, with Saint Anthony included at \$14.40.

The City of Saint Anthony Village uses these resources to support the following activities:

- Stormwater retention pond maintenance - 5
- Stormwater reuse and treatment systems – 3
- Stormwater collection systems – street based
- Local flood improvements
- Planning and reporting documentation required by various local and state agencies

The City has also received significant grant proceeds to assist with the construction of a stormwater reuse system, two stormwater treatment systems along with the upcoming Mirror Lake flood control project.

The ‘takeaway’ here is the City’s stormwater management practices are indicative of its overall approach to act and manage for a sustainable environment.

PARKS COMMISSION

The Saint Anthony Parks commission is a 5 member advisory commission appointed by the City Council. This year, with the help of our GreenCorp intern Kristin Seaman, St. Anthony was able to be designated as a Tree City USA. This will help St. Anthony ensure a sustainable plan for tree care and planting for the future.

Other projects we have worked on are exploring bike and pedestrian routes to include in the Comprehensive Plan and increasing pollinator plantings around the city.

The plan is forward looking with community engagement encouraging balanced input from all demographic categories - find your way to participate.

PLANNING UPDATE

By all accounts, St. Anthony is a leader among cities when it comes to promoting community sustainability. The City has welcomed a number of innovative stormwater management systems, and supports an active Citizens for Sustainability group whose initiatives range from bicycle advocacy to mapping pollinator gardens.

Whether by achieving the highest level as a member of the voluntary GreenStep Cities program or through its recent recognition as the recipient of the League of Minnesota Cities' 2016 Sustainable City Award, the City continues to demonstrate its commitment to sustainability in a number of high-profile ways.

Along with every municipality in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area, St. Anthony is now entering the process of updating its comprehensive plan. A comprehensive plan is a guiding document which aligns local and regional policy and outlines community goals and future policy directions. Cities are required by the Metropolitan Council to address particular elements such as land use, affordable housing, transportation, and

water resources. Sustainability is not a required comprehensive plan element – but its inclusion is strongly encouraged. In St. Anthony, a decision was made very early to seize the opportunity in this planning process to showcase the City's commitment to community sustainability.

The City continues to hear from


at stanthonycoplan.mysidewalk.com has often turned to resiliency, equity and environmental concerns.

On June 30, a group of City leaders participated in a PLANBuilder workshop facilitated by the U.S. Green Building Council Minnesota. The purpose of the workshop was to collaboratively develop key sustainability goals that will guide and support the comprehensive plan process. Some themes that emerged from this goal-setting workshop include the incorporation of transit and alternative modes into the transportation plan, investments in sustainable landscapes and infrastructure practices, setting attainable energy reduction goals, and

equity in sustainability initiatives. The comprehensive plan Steering Committee and city staff will look to the goal framework developed in the workshop to structure future discussions of sustainability in the comprehensive plan.

There are many details about the comprehensive plan update that remain to be decided. The next Steering Committee meeting will focus on sustainability and how to effectively incorporate this priority topic into the final plan.
