The city's Government Alliance on Race & Equity (GARE) team has been meeting monthly to further work on the Race and Equity Plan drafted late last year. The GARE team is part of the Implementation Cohort team that meets quarterly with the other entity's Implementation teams. The St. Anthony team's most recent group session was held in Rochester where the teams reviewed results based accountability and how that applies to furthering race and equity work. The team also had the opportunity to attend a GARE Speaker Series event on June 14th in Brooklyn Park and heard from Larry Hiscock of Nexus Community Partners, JooHee Pomplun of The Alliance, and (tentatively) Nelima Munene of the African Career, Education and Resource, Inc.

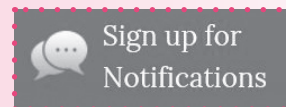
WAYS TO CONNECT AND ENGAGE

UPDATES FROM THE POLICE CHIEF

As we move into summer 2018, I would like to take a moment to provide information to the community in regards to our continuing efforts to improve our focus on enhancing community-oriented policing practices, transparency, professionalism, accountability, and public trust.

Since our last update that appeared in the Spring Village Notes, we have worked to infuse recent department training in the areas of Procedural Justice and Fair and Impartial Policing into our department policy and procedure manual. We have spent a great deal of time working with our Community Orientated Policing Services (COPS) technical assistance providers to enhance our policies in areas of Internal Affairs, to include the complaint and commendation process. We have worked through policy pertaining to employee performance evaluations, yearly training and new officer field training. We have developed Traffic/Pedestrian Safety Objectives that will be implemented in policy. Finally, we have been in the process of reviewing our Vehicle Pursuit Policy and Use of Force Policy to ensure they reflect industry best practices. It is our goal to incorporate the principles and recommendations from the Task Force on 21st Century Policing into our operational process, which has become a model for law enforcement agencies across the country.

During the week of April 30th, myself, along with Sgt. Mike Huddle (Department Community Engagement Coordinator) and with three community members joined our COPS Office site team lead on one of two technical assistance site visits to Northampton, MA, Police Department. The focus on this site visit was community engagement and how they have developed and implemented programs in partnership with community and regional stakeholders. As of this newsletter release, department training personnel have completed our second of two planned technical assistance site visits to the Burlington, VT, Police Department. The focus of this site visit was on de-escalation training and incorporating principles of Integrating Communication, Assessment and Tactics (ICAT) into the police use of force decision making model. It focuses on the key areas of decision-making, crisis recognition and response, tactical communications and negotiations, and operational safety tactics. ICAT integrates these skills and provides opportunities for police personnel to practice them through video case studies and scenario-based training exercises.

Lastly, we have spent a great deal of time building our St. Anthony Police Department 2018 Strategic Plan, which focuses on nine goals that the police department and community stakeholders have identified collectively. This plan is based on the COPS Office work plan that is directly tied to the release of our goals and

objectives, adopted March 23rd, 2017. Information on the St. Anthony Police Department 2018 Strategic Plan can be found on the City of St. Anthony website. I would encourage all members of the public to visit the website at www.savmn.com and sign up for notifications so that you can receive informative updates from the various city departments.

The St. Anthony Police Department remains committed to working with the Department of Justice in regards to the Collaborative Reform Initiative for Technical Assistance. We greatly appreciate the technical assistance this collaboration has provided. We will continue efforts to focus on the work plan we presented to the public back in February of this year, as we continue to build upon our police department strategic plan. We are committed to growing, learning and communicating with the greater community as we work to enhance community-oriented policing practices for everyone we serve.

UPDATES FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

WATER RESTRICTIONS

- No Watering between 11:00 am to 6:00 pm
- Odd numbered addresses may water on odd dates
- Even numbered addresses may water on even dates
- Exemptions may be granted for recently established lawns
- Water restrictions shall apply each year between April 1st and November 1st

WATER & SEWER EMERGENCIES

If you have a water or sewer emergency, contact city offices immediately at 612-782-3301 during normal business hours.

For after hours service, contact the Fire Department at 612-782-3400. City crews will be dispatched to evaluate the situation and assist the property owner.

Remember, the property owner is responsible for maintaining water or sanitary sewer service from their building up to and including the connection to the main water or sewer lines.

Reminder

I & I (Inflow/Infiltration) inspection is required by the City prior to the sale of a house.

FAMILY SERVICES COLLABORATIVE INITIATIVE

In January 2018, the St. Anthony-Family Services Collaborative approved funding to continue a partnership with Racial Equity Minnesota and St. Anthony Villagers for Equity and Community (SAVEC) to support their goal to mobilize the St. Anthony community to work together to build community, cohesion and a shared vision for equity and growth.

SAVEC was formed after a series of community meetings in 2017 which brought together youth and adults to explore how race impacts our residents and communities. Together, residents created aspirations for our community focused on: Education, Governance, Community Engagement and Awareness, and Religious Equity and Liberty. In July 2017, SAVEC and Racial Equity Minnesota hosted a gathering with over 100 community members to provide education and awareness on how structural racism impacts our community and gather input on the four focus areas.



In December 2017, SAVEC established an Executive Board, with members leading four subcommittees: Nimo Hashi (education), Hawo Kamal (Religious Equity), Sirri Nomo (Governance), Ben Phillip (Community Engagement and Awareness), and Bharat Thyagarajan (Governance). In May 2018, Ben Phillip was one of three community members who accompanied the St. Anthony Police Department on the site visit to Northampton, MA.

St. Anthony Villagers for Equity and Community is committed to building a grassroots process that respects all voices, is inclusive of all community members, focused on community decision making, and holds itself accountable to measurable outcomes. Currently, the group is holding a series of listening sessions with St. Anthony residents of color to help prioritize areas the group should focus on addressing within the Village. There's a few things that we'd like to help remind you of as we transition into Summer!

Pet Safety! The sun can play tricks on us! It can be as low as the 30's when we leave our homes in the early morning, but temperatures can soar to dangerous levels for our four-legged life companions that come with us everywhere. With ambient air temperatures at 75 degrees, in direct sunlight, the inside of a vehicle can soar to well above the century mark. Organ damage happens in mere minutes. Please give the forecast an extra glance before bringing "Fido" along to Cub Foods and consider other options.

Home Safety! Nothing beats the scent of a fresh warm breeze, cascading from room to room through your home, it's very important to remember that although beautiful weather brings our neighbors out, it also tends to bring out opportunity for burglars. Remember to close and lock your windows if you run out, even if it's just to pick up a quick Burrito at Catrina's. Always lock your doors, and make home and car security part of your nightly "9 PM routine". Not sure what 9 PM Routine is exactly? Search the web or your favorite social media platform under the hashtag "#9PM Routine"

Vehicle Safety! Time to check your tires, oil, lights, and other weather-sensitive bells and whistles. If you live in one of our multi-unit communities like the Landings/ Legends, and you park outside all winter, it's likely that things will contract and expand with the

change in temperature. Especially sensitive to weather changes are our tires. You can prevent an accident by merely taking a few minutes to check the tread on our tires, keeping a watchful eye for bulges and cracks, nails and other objects, as well as bent or damaged rims. Light bulbs have a bad habit of going on the fritz as the weather transitions as well.

WHEN THUNDER ROARS, GO INDOORS!

Summer heat is here, and stormy weather is on the radar. Lightning is typically more prevalent in the summer months, but it can strike all year round. According to the National Weather Service, on average, forty-seven people die and hundreds more are severely injured by lightning strikes each year in the United States. Here are some quick tips to keep yourself and others safe when lightning decides to hit:

- Avoid open areas, especially if you are at the highest point in elevation.
- Stay away from metal conductors. Examples are but not limited to fences, wires, flag poles... etc.

- No place outside is safe; if you hear thunder, you are at risk of getting struck by lightning. It is best to seek shelter inside a safe building or under a strong, secure structure.
- Never seek shelter under an isolated tree.
- Immediately get out and away from bodies of water, such as but not limited to swimming pools, lakes, showers, baths, puddles etc.

If someone gets struck by lightning, don't be a victim too. Move the victim to a safer place if possible. Lightning can strike the same area twice. Call 9-1-1 and begin CPR with an AED if available.

How would you like to improve the safety of your neighborhood, have a fun time with your neighbors, build community and take part in a huge statewide program?

You can do it all at this year's Minnesota Night to Unite (NTU) celebration on Tuesday, August 7th! For residents of St. Anthony, this is an opportunity to put together a neighborhood celebration, turn on the front porch lights, gather with neighbors and friends, get to know one another, catch up on things, play some games with the kids, enjoy a few hot-off-the-grill favorites, have some ice cream, receive a visit from the police/fire department and build a sense of community.



On Tuesday, August 7th, 2018 from approximately 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm, the St. Anthony Police Department invites St. Anthony neighborhoods to join neighborhoods throughout Minnesota for this fun filled evening.

What is building community?

This is a simple but powerful method for people to improve their own and others' living conditions. At its most basic, this is neighbors working together to create positive changes in their neighborhoods; whether they're trying to reduce crime, look out for each other's property, or get involved in the community. People working together with shared understandings and expectations are what provide an atmosphere of strong community. A strong community sends a message to criminals letting them know that our neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Already involved in a neighborhood crime watch group?

NTU will help keep your group active. This is important. Neighbors who know each other and agree to watch out for suspicious behavior are a great defense against crime. If you do not have a crime watch group, NTU is a great way to get neighbors together for the first time and start building relationships. You can make your NTU event as simple or as elaborate as you like. The main point of this evening is for residents to gather as neighbors to affirm their commitment to a safe, healthy community.

Get your children involved in this event. Kids bring great energy and enthusiasm to NTU events. Get all ages busy with your NTU planning this year. Involving children and teens can have a great long-term benefit for your block.

Can my apartment complex sign up for Night to Unite?

Apartment complexes are neighborhoods, within themselves, and are encouraged to plan an event. As you plan your NTU event, try to draw in all the people you can. Everyone benefits when neighbors know each other. The connections that are made and strengthened through NTU carry far beyond this evening.

Will there be ice cream certificates?

In keeping with tradition, the St. Anthony Cub Foods Store (3930 Silver Lake Road) is again partnering with the Police Department in promoting Minnesota "Night to Unite" events. The Cub Store is providing a 5 quart pail of Kemps vanilla ice cream to each resident who hosts a party on August 7th.

How do I register my Night to Unite Event?

Residents with questions, or who plan to host a block party on August 7th are asked to visit the Village of St. Anthony website: www.savmn.com. Click on the link for MN Night to Unite and fill out the request form electronically. You will automatically receive a confirmation email. Please register by Thursday, August 2nd. Please fully complete the registration form and note whether you request visits from the Police department, Fire department and city staff and if you will need the Public Works Department to drop off street barricades. The Police Department will deliver ice cream certificates prior to Night to Unite. (Note: to be able to accommodate requests for ice cream certificates, in a timely manner, only those who sign up prior to the August 2nd deadline will receive certificates). The City Public Works Department will deliver street barricades, to the host address, for those that indicate the request on the registration form. SAPD will notify the Public Works reference barricade needs. In addition, we will provide block lists to the St. Anthony Fire Department, the Honorable Mayor, City Council and City Staff.

SAINT ANTHONY VILLAGE IS A STEP 5 GREENSTEP CITY

Saint Anthony Village became one of the first six cities in the state to receive the 5th Step of the GreenStep Cities program.

GreenStep Cities is a public/private partnership administered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. Step 5 requires cities to complete metrics for the current conditions in the following topics: City Buildings and Lighting; Transportation Modes and Miles; Pervious Land, Parks and Trees; Stormwater; Renewable Energy; Infrastructure for Walking and Biking; Car, Transit and Bike Options; Drinking Water; Waste Water; Climate.

Now that data is recorded for each of these metrics, the city's progress can be tracked and compared as time passes to see how the improvements and investments that were made have changed the conditions of the city's progress towards sustainability.

ENGINEERING UPDATES

2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The 2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project is underway. The first items will be setting up traffic control signs, tree removals, installing the temporary water system, pavement removal, and sanitary sewer and watermain replacement. In addition, Center Point Energy has been on site to replace the existing gas mains. The project is proposed to be completed in phases to allow access to properties as feasible:

Phase 1: Macalaster Drive

Phase 2: Foss Road

Phase 3: Highcrest Road

Phases 1 and 2 will be completed simultaneously and will be broken into multiple smaller phases.

2017 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The 2017 Street and Utility Improvement Project is complete. The Contractor has completed final paving and remaining construction clean-up items. We will continue to track the lawn restoration work and will be completing warrantee inspections over the next two years. 2017 37th Avenue Sidewalk and Signal Project

The 2017 Pedestrian Improvement Project, which included building a new Sidewalk along 37th Avenue and providing ADA Signal improvements at five intersections was substantially complete in the fall of 2017. The remaining work includes removing and replacing crosswalk markings at the intersections affected by the project and completing restoration of areas disturbed by the project. This work is anticipated to be completed in summer of 2018.



Mirror Lake Water Quality and Flood Improvement Project

The Contractor has completed removal of sediment from the lake and is completing final clean up. The contractor will be on site periodically to perform maintenance on the vegetation and trees planted last spring/summer.

Completion of the Mirror Lake Dredging Project will increase flood protection to homes and businesses adjacent to Mirror Lake by providing additional flood storage. The shoreline was constructed with safer slopes

and vegetation that benefits pollinator species, bees and butterflies and improved the quality of water being sent downstream to Long Lake in New Brighton. If there are any items remaining to be addressed, please call Todd Hubmer at 763-287-7182.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE

The City of St. Anthony is nearing completion of the required 2018 Update to Comprehensive Plan. A draft was approved at the City Council meeting on May 22nd. The city has and will continue to receive comments from the public, other adjacent communities, and the Metropolitan Council. State Statute requires every adjacent jurisdiction (cities, school districts, counties, watershed districts, and state agencies) be given 6 months to review and comment on the draft comprehensive plan, which starts June 1st. Therefore, a final draft will be compiled, based on the comments received. This final draft will be presented to the Steering Committee and City Council in December/January.

CITY CODE COMPLIANCE ON PRIVATE PROPERTIES

As we all work towards the goal of making our community a beautiful place to live and upholding property values, the city would like to remind residents to maintain their properties and comply with the code of ordinances.

Common violations for the summer season include:

- Outside storage of materials or junk
- Long-term (more than 24 hours) parking of recreational vehicles or boats on city streets
- Loose garbage and overflowing trash receptacles
- Parking on grass or non-paved surfaces
- Grass/weeds being allowed to grow past six (6) inches.

ORGANICS DISCUSSION

The Saint Anthony City Council asked the Parks Commission to recommend a site or sites to set up an organics recycling drop-off. Organics recycling has become much more common throughout the Metro area in recent years with some cities having drop sites for residents and some cities doing curbside pickup. The Parks Commission recommendation was presented to the City Council at the June 26th council meeting.

Organics recycling involves collecting food waste and compostable material to turn into compost thereby reducing the amount of trash. Examples of organic material that can be recycled include: food scraps, bones, meats, egg shells, food soiled paper products like napkins and paper towels, coffee grounds, grains and nut shells. Currently, all St. Anthony residents can participate in organics recycling through Ramsey County at the Arden Hills yard waste site but our goal is to make it more accessible to residents by having it located in St. Anthony.

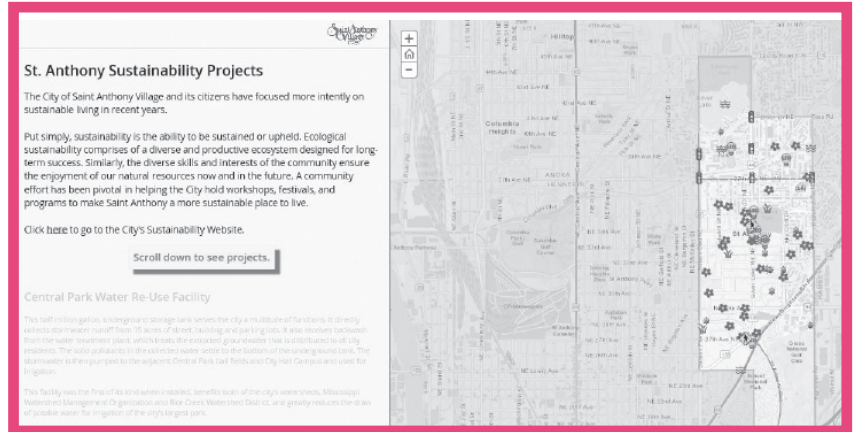
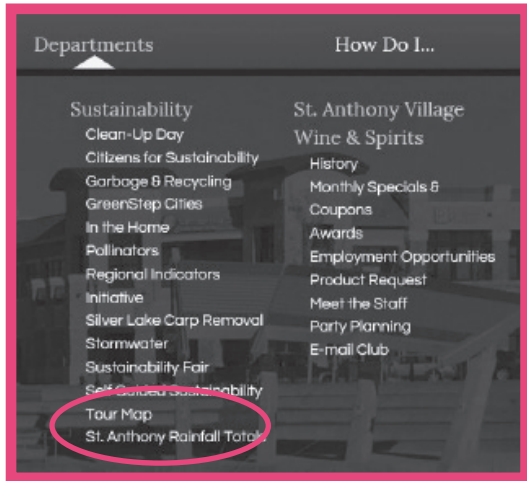
2017 AUDIT COMPLETE

Each year the City is audited by a public accounting firm. This year, as in past years, the City received a "clean opinion". Essentially meaning there were no adjustments made to the City's books and there were no other audit related findings. The financial activity for all operating, capital improvement and debt service funds are found within the audit report. Furthermore, the audit report includes numerous footnotes for greater insight into topics related to the City's overall financial health. These disclosures are an important tool used by Bond rating services for their rating process. Bond ratings play a role in determining the interest rate paid on City loans. The 2017 financial statements were presented by the City's auditor to the City Council at the June 26th council meeting. The Finance staff works diligently to ensure that the City's annual financial statements provide an accurate and complete picture of the City's financial position. The City's 2017 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report is available on the City's website.

RECYCLE YOUR YARD WASTE

Did you know? Leaves, grass clippings, trees and other types of yard waste are banned from the trash. Composting is the best option! The plant material breaks down into a rich soil amendment.

All residents may bring plant waste to any one of the County's seven yard waste sites. A photo ID is required. All sites accept leaves, grass clippings, garden plants, and other non-woody plants. Some also accept trees and shrubs (no stumps).

The closest yard waste site to you is Arden Hills, which is located at 3530 Hudson Avenue. This site DOES accept trees and shrubs.

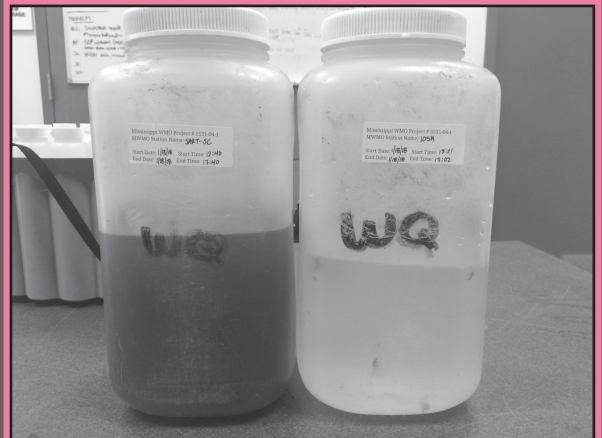
