STUDENTS IN GOVERNMENT

On November 15th, city staff and council participated in the Students in Government Day with students from St. Anthony Village High School. We began with an overview of the city's organizational and governance structure, students were then paired with a department head for a tour and department-specific activities at the police, fire, public works and liquor operations.

Next the students prepared to participate in a mock city council meeting. Those students chosen to act as mayor and city council members worked in the council chambers with Assistant to the City Manager Charlie Yunker and City Clerk Nicole Miller on Robert's Rules of Order and meeting protocol.

The remaining students were split into three groups, each group working with a department head to develop a specific project proposal for council consideration, with the understanding that only one project would be approved. Fire Chief Mark Sitarz's group proposed building a new fire station to replace a fictitious aging structure, City Engineer Todd Hubmer's group proposed reconstruction of Silver Lake Road, and Public Works Director Jay Hartman's group proposed building a new park.

After the mock council meeting commenced, each group presented their proposals and answered thoughtful questions by the council. Councilmember Randle Stille, acting as a concerned resident, addressed the council, offering a fourth option and giving reasons not to approve any of the students' proposals. Following several motions and seconds, a majority approved the proposal for a new fire station. Once the meeting was adjourned, the mayor and council were individually re-elected or voted out by the students. The day concluded with students meeting with the real mayor and city council members in small groups and sharing a meal with staff, council, and the school superintendent.

It was truly impressive to witness the caliber of questions and comments from the students, and the professionalism of their proposals. The previous evening, many of us were able to participate in the latest meeting of Courageous Conversations, a series of community gatherings initiated and led by the student group Dare 2 B Real. These two events, Students in Government and Courageous Conversations, did an excellent job showcasing the incredibly bright and articulate students in our community. The future is in good hands.



MID TERM ELECTION RECAP



Ramsey County had 13 early voting centers set up for the 2018 election, and for the second year in a row St. Anthony Council Chambers was set up as an early voting center. All St. Anthony residents and residents living in any Ramsey County city could vote 7 days prior to election day at our early voting center!

This year in Ramsey County, more people voted early in person (in person absentee and early voting centers) compared to voting by mail! With the shift in voting trends we will continue to work with the Counties to make adjustments, and provide the voter with many options to cast their vote.

New this year we were fortunate to have student election judges at each of our three precincts! The student election judges did a great job and we look forward to having them every year!

We have a new organics recycling collection site located next to City Hall (3301 Silver Lake Road). You can use it anytime! Look for the enclosure at the south end of the parking lot. This site is for residential use only. No businesses please.

Recycling your food scraps and other organic waste returns essential nutrients to the soil and improves soil health. Do your part and get started by collecting organics recycling in four easy steps:

1. Visit City Hall to pick up a free starter kit. The starter kit includes a small kitchen caddy, compostable bags and tips for success.
2. Fill up your compostable bags with organics recycling. See our accepted and not accepted list.
3. Bring it to our collection site for free disposal.
4. Pick up more compostable bags at City Hall.



Have the package delivered to the Post Office and pick it up from there.




The holiday season and immediately after have the largest increase in home burglaries than any other time of the year.



WINTER PARKING AND SNOW PLOWING

During the winter, the number one priority of the Public Works Department is to clear the snow and make St. Anthony's streets safe for traffic and emergency vehicles. Here are a few reminders to assist residents in achieving this goal:

Residents are NOT allowed to park on ANY street for a period of 48 hours, beginning immediately after two (2) inches or more of continuous snow fall or until the snow removal has been completed from curb to curb.

The City understands that sometimes the schedule for snow removal doesn't correlate with residents' snow shoveling schedules. The snow plow drivers do their best to avoid pushing windrows of snow back onto freshly shoveled driveways or sidewalks.

Remember, it is dangerous for children to dig tunnels in the windrows of snow created by the snow plows. Tunnels can cave in, smothering the child. Plow drivers can't see children playing in or around the windrows and they can be covered or trapped in the snow.

Other ways to assist with snow removal operations include:

- *Don't place refuse or recycling containers in the street; and
- *Don't plow, blow or shovel snow into the street; and
- *When shoveling, pile snow downstream of the plowing operations to minimize snow left in your driveway; and
- *Stay back when driving behind plow trucks.

With your cooperation, snow removal can be more efficient and roads cleared in very little time. For after hours service, contact the Fire Department at 612-782-3400 or call 911. City crews will be dispatched to evaluate the situation and assist the property owner.

Remember, the property owner is responsible for maintaining water or sanitary sewer service from their building up to and including the connection to the main water or sewer lines.

GOVERNMENT ALLIANCE ON RACE AND EQUITY (GARE)

Members of the city's Government Alliance on Race & Equity (GARE) team attended a speaker series event on Wednesday, December 12th at the Wellstone Center in St. Paul, where they heard from the editor of "A Good Time for the Truth: Race in Minnesota" and contributing essayists Taiyon J. Coleman, an Assistant Professor of English Literature at St. Catherine University, and Shannon Gibney, a writer, educator, activist, and the author of "See No Color."

The team has continued to work on the city's Race & Equity Plan that was formalized at the end of 2017. The team made progress on action items from the plan like; increasing staff capacity through customer service training, exploring methods to track and analyze code enforcement data, and the drafting of an internship program for the Public Works Department. In addition, activities like the Police Department's participation in the COPS program, Students in Government and Youth in Government have also taken place throughout the past year.

Work will continue on these and other action items from the plan. The city is continuing in the GARE Implementation Cohort in 2019 and working with the League of Minnesota Cities on other resources as they become available.

UPDATES FROM THE POLICE CHIEF

Throughout 2018, our police department has remained focused on working closely with our COPS Office technical assistance partners in order to achieve our community stakeholder identified goals and objectives. The Department of Justice Collaborative Reform Initiative for Technical Assistance (DOJ CRI-TA) site team made monthly visits to our police department to provide technical assistance and connect our personnel with subject matter experts. The ultimate goal was to increase our capacity and bandwidth within our agency as we pursued the development of a department strategic plan which was unveiled to the public this past June (2018) during an open house. This document, our supporting mission and vision, along with historical information regarding CRI-TA can be found on our website by visiting www.savmn.com.

A clear vision creates clarity of purpose. A clear mission improves the quality of our service. Our identified goals and objectives must directly tie into our mission and vision. The police department's mission and vision must directly tie into the city mission and vision. All of our police officers must be able to plausibly articulate how any policing action they may take fits into the departments' mission and vision.

I am pleased to report that we continue to make great progress in terms of technology and transparency. We have fully implemented our Panasonic Body Worn Camera (BWC) program as of November 9th, 2018. Officers of the St. Anthony Police Department have embraced this technology and have been diligent in following policy regarding deployment and use. Daily record management reviews are conducted to

ensure equipment is being used properly. Department supervisors are required to complete monthly audits to ensure equipment is being used properly and in accordance with policy. Our squad cars have also been outfitted with new Panasonic HD squad cameras that are designed to pair with the BWC technology. We have now begun the last phase of our camera project by addressing upgrades to our facility camera system. This will result in a fully integrated audio and video system that will allow for our staff to have audio/video coverage through multiple phases of contact with the public.

We must remain mindful that audio and video equipment is not a complete end-all do-all fix for capturing all aspects of police encounters with the public. People who have never seen a police officer's everyday reality up close can easily overlook just how difficult it can be to face the everyday challenges associated with policing. We, as police officers, must adhere to the Pillars of Procedural Justice and Fair and Impartial Policing. In the policing profession, perception is reality, and the most effective tool(s) we have are housed within the framework of these two tenets. By and large, our police officers have big hearts and a service mind set. They endeavor to serve to the best of their ability.

The St. Anthony Police Department will remain committed to the goals and objectives outlined in our police department strategic plan. It will aid in focusing our resources, making data driven decisions and evaluating how we take inputs from community stakeholders and apply them with the goal to improve the overall quality of life by preserving the peace and safety of our community.

ICE SLIPS AND FALL SAFETY

Winter flurries have arrived in Minnesota and with this weather change brings ice, which causes sidewalks, driveways and walking areas to be slippery. The ice in these areas can be hidden underneath a light coating of snow and go undetectable until you take the wrong step. Slipping on a patch of ice can be devastating and cause injuries that require medical care and heal time. Below are a few pointers that can help prevent you from slipping and falling in icy areas:

- Wear shoes or boots with a good tread, this will add good grip when walking on the snow and ice.
- Use caution when entering and exiting vehicles.
- Take it slow when walking outside, if handrails are present use them for support.
- Watch out for black ice, just because you cannot see it doesn't mean it's not there.
- Treat icy areas with ice melt or salt to help dissolve and break up the ice patch.



Although, there are many ways to prevent slipping on ice, the best way is to take your time!

ENGINEERING UPDATES

2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The Contractor has substantially completed the street reconstruction, utility replacements, restoration and clean-up for the 2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project. The Contractor will return in the spring of 2019 to complete the sidewalk installation along the west side of Foss Road, retaining wall construction, driveway restoration (temporary bituminous patches have been installed for the winter), place the final layer of asphalt pavement throughout the project corridor, and address any warranty items.

County Road C Reconstruction

Ramsey County and Hennepin County are proposing to reconstruct County Road C (29th Avenue NE) from Highway 88 to Interstate 35W. Improvements proposed along County Road C (29th Avenue NE) within the City of St. Anthony Village (Highway 88 to the eastern City limits) include reconstructing the existing roadway, installation of a 10-foot bituminous trail along the south side of the roadway, installation of a 6-foot concrete sidewalk along the north side of the roadway, and drainage improvements to accommodate area drainage. The County Road C (29th Avenue NE) improvements will also include removal and replacement of the City's watermain and sanitary sewer system.

ENGINEERING UPDATES

Silver Lake Road Flood Reduction Improvements

Flood improvements on Silver Lake Road consist of the installation of new storm sewer and catch basins along the east side of Silver Lake Road from approximately 250 feet south of Silver Lane to approximately 600 feet north of Silver Lane to supplement the existing trunk storm sewer main on the west side of Silver Lake Road.

Industrial Park Flood Improvements


Flood improvements within the industrial park, located south of County Road C (29th Avenue NE), consist of expansion of the existing flood pond located between the cemetery and the industrial park to provide additional stormwater storage.

Silver Lake Road and 33rd Avenue Signal Improvements

Improvements at the intersection of Silver Lake Road and 33rd Avenue NE consist of installing a flashing yellow turn signal to allow traffic to make a left turn from Silver Lake Road as traffic allows.

TIME IS MONEY!

Remote deposits are a growing trend today. To reduce staff time involved in recording, preparing, and actually making the drive to the bank for a deposit, the check scanner was implemented at City Hall. The check scanner enables on-site electronic deposit and moves from paper to an electronic deposit process. Currently, the Finance department processes approximately 1,955 checks every quarter. Checks are securely scanned in as they come and staff transmits the deposits to the bank electronically at the end of the day. The deposits post to the City bank account the next business day versus what could take up to 2 to 3 business days in the past.

Not only does the check scanner securely store electronic deposited paper checks, it can also detect duplicate checks. This mitigates fraud risk and strengthens internal control. In addition, costs associated with paper are reduced since reports can be accessed electronically now. By speeding up deposit process with the new on-site check scanner, staff can be more efficient with their time. Savings on time means savings on money! Time is valuable, we often take that for granted.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT EXERCISE

Mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery are the 4 fundamental principles/phases that make up emergency management. They provide guidance and a path during an incident or emergency where many may possibly be affected.

On the night of November 19th, the City of St. Anthony staff along with the city council and various outside agencies held a water contamination exercise that took place here within the city. This exercise covered the above aforementioned principles/phases with the goal of creating dialogue, action items and introductions among those in attendance.

The scenario was that our drinking water became contaminated and a “boil water advisory” was to be issued to members of the community. Outside agencies like the Minnesota Department of Health who are the subject matter experts on this played a large part in this exercise. We also had both Hennepin and Ramsey County Environmental Health, Hennepin Emergency Management, Ramsey Emergency Management and representatives from the school district. One key invite was Nick Eggers from the City of Hastings which back in September of this year went through this very scenario but on a real life scale.

Many lessons were learned on this night by all parties involved but one of the biggest is that we as a city cannot do it all on our own because we will not have all of the answers. We will rely on our neighbors, those outside agencies and our residents to help get us through an event similar to what we focused on. We cannot think that if we are going to get back to our “normal” that we can do it on our own.

Upon completion, a common theme among the 33 in attendance was that many of the lessons learned would apply to other possible incidents they may someday be involved in because as you know, we cannot predict the future but we can certainly train for it.

COUNCIL SUPPORT FOR THE 2040 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

Thanks to a robust public engagement process to guide development of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan, the City Council gave preliminary approval to the plan. This three-year process began with a presentation at the City’s strategic planning session in January 2016. Since then, a steering committee led the process through over 15 public engagement sessions including large visioning sessions to small focus groups and one-on-one conversations, engaging over 250 residents and community members.

Feedback was overwhelmingly positive. People love living in the city, are proud of the schools, happy with their proximity to places to shop and eat, and think St. Anthony is peaceful and quiet.

The next step is for the Metropolitan Council to approve the plan. It will then come back to the city for final adoption. Not to rest on success, then we will begin implementation of the plan. 


WATER CONSERVATION POSTER CONTEST


