Note from the Mayor

Dear Residents,

As summer winds down and we get into our fall routines, it is good to review some of this summer's events and projects.

We need to be appreciative of the efforts of all the volunteers in a well-planned and run Village Fest. This could not occur without those truly dedicated volunteers supported by city staff. Additionally, the Salo Summer Concerts that took place at Salo Park from June through August are an amenity that is provided to us by a volunteer group funded by our local businesses and individuals – we thank you all for another splendid summers' performance. And then to all of the block party hostess'/hosts' who organized their Nite To Unite parties with public safety participation and visits by city staff, another great year.

After a construction season of dodging signs, construction cones and weather delays, we see Silver Lake Road's flooding issues mitigated, with Ramsey County doing a late fall mill and overlay of the roadway. The County Road C project is coming along and of course with the amount of traffic that road carries - the timeline is a bit longer due to the scope of the project but the majority of that work is to be complete prior to winter. This also sees the culmination of our Green Corp member, Minette Saulog, who was assigned to us from October 2018 through August 2019. She has done a magnificent job in areas of energy reduction for the city, compostable/organics recycle station at city hall, outreach to students on sustainability and with a highly enthusiastic approach to all the issues she approached – we are grateful for her outstanding work!

The city was selected as 1 of 11 state wide cities to present one day at the Minnesota State Fair on our sustainability work using our interactive “Sustainability Puzzle”, this is also on our website for your use. We were able to share that with the Lt Governor, Commissioner's of Commerce and Pollution Control Agency. Again, St Anthony leads the way and is recognized for its forward thinking and actions.

I would remind all residents that a city election is coming this November 5th with the Mayor and 2 Councilmembers position up for election. I highly encourage you to vote on that day or go to city hall and vote absentee – no reasons required. So, there is no valid excuse not to vote. (see article inside).



GROW YOUR BUSINESS IN ST. ANTHONY

This fall the city of St. Anthony Village is conducting a Business Retention & Expansion (BR&E) program in order to learn more about the businesses within St. Anthony Village, to help identify future needs, and to support business retention and expansion initiatives. Although economic development often seems to focus on recruiting new businesses, research shows that 70% of business expansion occurs from within. Our existing businesses are very important to the city, and we want them to stay and grow in St. Anthony Village.



As the result of our annual strategic plan, this spring the Hamline University Economic Development Certification Program class analyzed the Anthony Lane Business Park. Their findings presented at the June 3rd City Council Work Session included a recommendation to conduct a BR&E as a way to engage with our existing businesses. This process began this fall, includes on-site meetings where city staff interview management to learn more about the businesses and potential future needs. Once the Anthony Lane Business Park BR&E is completed, the results will be shared.

This type of collaboration benefits businesses and helps maintain the economic health of the community. We greatly appreciate the input and partnership in keeping St. Anthony Village a vibrant city.

The City of St. Anthony is seeking applicants for the Planning Commission and Parks and Environmental Commissions.



The City understands that sometimes the schedule for snow removal doesn't correlate with residents' snow shoveling schedules. The snow plow drivers do their best to avoid pushing windrows of snow back onto freshly shoveled driveways or sidewalks.

UPDATES FROM THE POLICE CHIEF

The St. Anthony Police Department is committed to Community Oriented Policing. We strive to establish connections with all community members and rely on positive relationships to solve issues. With this in mind, we added participating in public safety joint mental health initiatives to our police department strategic plan and goal pyramid following city goal setting sessions that took place in January of 2019. Furthermore, the city placed this initiative as an action step in efforts to help ensure a safe and secure community. On July 23rd of this year, the St. Anthony City Council approve a service agreement with Northeast Youth and Family Services (NYFS) to provide a Community Case Manager. In partnership with NYFS and our partner Ramsey County Law Enforcement Agencies, NYFS has hired a community case worker who will perform follow up services on selected police calls for service related to connecting referred households/individuals with basic services with regard to mental health or any other basic family need. The Community Case Manager will act to provide "follow up" activities to referred households which will include efforts to establish a relationship, assess needs, develop a Goal Action Plan, connect to resources, and follow up on the impact of the Goal Action Plan. The case manager will work with the police department to identify individuals/households that would be appropriate candidates. The end result being to avoid multiple calls for service by Law Enforcement (possible fire rescue) on sometimes a daily, weekly and monthly basis to persons in crises in the community. These types of calls for service can be very involved and exhaust city resources. Unfortunately, and sometimes tragically, some "person in crises" calls can turn into unavoidable and unwanted use of force encounters. It is our goal that this initiative will serve as a considerable action step toward meeting the city and police departments' goals of participating in public safety joint mental health initiatives as referenced on the city's strategic pyramid.

THE 2020 BUDGET PROCESS TO DATE

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At the September 10th City Council meeting a preliminary budget and property tax levy for 2020 was approved. The Final budget and property tax levy will be approved at the December 10th City Council meeting.

The League of Minnesota Cities handbook for Cities begins its chapter on Municipal Budgeting by noting that **“Done thoroughly, city budgets reflect city plans, policies and goals regarding services and sound resource management. Consider city goals, what programs and services citizens want in the city and then look to sustaining or allocating funding for those goals, using the budget document as an important communication tool revealing a city’s plan for the coming year.”**

In order to produce a budget document that incorporates these recommendations, on an annual basis, the City follows the budget workflow as shown below. To view the budget materials used at various stages of the budget process visit www.savmn.com/budget to use the interactive table.

The City's budget results are audited each year. The annual audit report includes required supplemental information that compares the audited revenue and expenses against the budgeted revenues and expenses. The 2018 audit along with the 2019 Budget is available at www.savmn.com/budget.

The League of Minnesota Cities handbook for Cities concludes its chapter on Municipal Budgeting by noting that **“Accurate and complete budgeting is crucial to a city. It provides sound legal, financial and ethical basis for city operations. Done correctly, budgets show the revenues and expenditures necessary to provide the services and programs desired by the community. It reflects the goals, objectives, and priorities the current council identifies, based on input from previous council decisions, the residents and taxpayers.”**

The collaborative efforts made by the City Council, City Commissions, City Staff along with Resident input is reflected in the City's annual budget process that strives to be **“Done correctly”**.

SAFE MEDICATION DISPOSAL

Misuse of, and addiction to prescription drugs has reached a level of crisis in the United States. Accidental poisonings are also on the rise. In St. Anthony, we are doing something about it.

In May, the St. Anthony Police Department qualified for a Minnesota State grant to purchase a waste medication collection bin. Additionally, we applied for and received a household pharmaceutical collection site license. The collection bin was recently installed within the St. Anthony Police Department (SAPD) lobby and we will soon be listed on a state and county website as a location that participates in a Household Pharmaceutical Take Back Program.



What does this mean for our community? It means that the public will have access to safely dispose of household pharmaceuticals in a secure receptacle located inside the SAPD lobby during business hours (8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday). The SAPD is located inside the city's Community Center at 3301 Silver Lake Rd.

What items are accepted for disposal within the receptacle? Medicines from households are accepted, which include:

- ✓ Prescription medicines including Schedule II-IV controlled substances (such as Vicodin, Percocet and Ritalin).
- ✓ Over-the-counter medications.
- ✓ Pet medicines.

Items that are NOT accepted:

- ✗ No illegal drugs (Schedule I controlled substances).
- ✗ No needles, sharps or syringes (to find safe syringe and sharps disposal locations, visit <https://safeneedledisposal.org>).
- ✗ No medicines from businesses.
- ✗ No batteries, trash, medical devices, mercury thermometers or other hazardous materials.
- ✗ No cosmetics and personal care products.

If you are visiting a box at an independent pharmacy, be sure to visit their website for a full list of what is and is not accepted as there may be additional items besides those listed above.

CITY CODE 101: UNDERSTANDING ZONING ORDINANCE AND LAND-USE PLANNING AND PROCESS

Most of us are familiar with the idea that St. Anthony has a Zoning Ordinance, which regulates land use in the community. How exactly the Zoning Ordinance works, and what it is trying to accomplish, is often much less common knowledge. The following information is intended to provide more background in what zoning does, and how it works in St. Anthony.

A zoning ordinance, in its most basic form, regulates the types of uses that land can be used for, as well as the intensity of those uses. The general purpose of zoning is to establish rules that lead everyone to a common set of expectations for the use of property, both our own, and that of our neighbors. This can help minimize disputes about the impacts that our use of property can create, like noise, traffic, lights, etc.

From the planning perspective, we are also able to make plans for necessary public services that will be required for the neighborhood and the community to properly function. Such as, how much utility capacity should we expect to provide? How much traffic will our streets need to carry? This aspect of zoning makes it one of the key implementation tools for the City's Comprehensive Plan, which is the policy document that guides St. Anthony's land use and related decision-making process.


The Zoning Ordinance creates a series of districts where specific land uses are permitted. Similar uses are usually clustered into a single district, with the expectation that those uses will have similar impacts on the neighborhood or the public. It is common to have separate districts for industrial uses, commercial retail and/or office uses, and differing residential districts based on density and type of unit.

Each district will identify the size of buildings that are allowed on their respective lots, and how intensively the area can be developed. Various external standards, including setbacks, open space, parking requirements,

landscaping, lighting, impervious surface coverage (such as paved sidewalks, roadways) and other rules are established to give everyone a baseline understanding of the maximum impacts that might be expected from the property. When working within these rules, the permitting and development process for a project should go reasonably smooth.

When somebody proposes to exceed those limits, there is a legal process that is laid out in the Zoning Ordinance, typically by a variance or conditional use permit. For this process, St. Anthony retains some discretion as to whether the proposal will maintain the expectations that the Zoning Ordinance intends for that use and neighborhood. This process progresses to a public review stage, usually before the Planning Commission, and draws on the overall objectives for land use that the City has identified in the Comprehensive Plan. The City Council makes the final decision on these requests.

The Zoning Ordinance can be found on the City of St. Anthony's website, as Chapter 152 within the City Code. If you are contemplating beginning a building process, please review this section of the website, and certainly check with city staff if you have any questions. In addition to the new group, with the help of city staff and guidance from the Pollinator Friendly Alliance, we drafted a pollinator protection resolution, which was passed by the Mayor and City Council in August. The resolution, which can be found on the pollinator page of the city website, declares St. Anthony to be a "Pollinator Friendly Community" and sets out policies and practices the city will adopt to protect pollinators. The resolution also lists pollinator protection practices that residents can adopt, including planting more habitat and food on their property that attracts pollinators, as well as avoiding the use of pesticides on their lawns, trees, plants, and other property.

KEEP AUTUMN LEAVES OFF THE GROUND AND OUT OF THE STORM DRAIN

Lovely to look at as they drift from the trees, autumn leaves left to accumulate on the ground can have negative effects on the health of local waterways. Street and yard flooding, litter “dams,” and algae growth can occur when leaves block or enter the storm drain. To combat such consequences, keep leaves and yard debris out of the storm drains. Raking, bagging, or composting are easy alternatives for keeping the leaves off the ground and out of the storm drain. The purpose of the storm drain, or catch basin, is to collect the rain water and melted snow—not leaves, trash, or other pollutants. Here’s what happens when fallen leaves are left untended:

- Leaves that fall to the ground inevitably accumulate at the mouth of stormwater drains and ditches, causing “dams” that capture both leaves and litter.
- These pollutants then clog up the storm drains and ditches causing street flooding (even with light or moderate rainfall).
- Once the leaves that enter the storm drain begin to decay, they release nutrients that contribute to excess algae growth in the waterways.
- Algae growth uses up dissolved oxygen needed by aquatic wildlife and can result in a decline in their population.

In addition, while cleaning up outside, make sure to pick up after your pet. When it rains, pet waste can be washed into the storm drain and into area stream rivers, and lakes polluting the water we recreate in and harming aquatic life with high levels of nitrogen and bacteria.

Good to Do:

- Before you clean up outside, pick up after your pet!
- Clean up your leaves and yard debris.
- Check with your refuse hauler to learn when leaves will be collected and how they should be stored (bagging, placement, etc.) and only place leaves and yard debris out at the designated time.
- Do not rake or blow leaves into the street where they can be washed into the storm drain.
- Consider using the leaves as mulch, mowing over them and leaving the finely-chopped debris on your yard.
- If you choose to compost your leaves, contain your compost in a bin.
- Never dump leaves or yard debris into ditches, streams, or other waterways.

ORGANICS RECYCLING REMINDERS

Since opening in January, the 24/7 organics recycling drop-off at City Hall has been very popular! Here are some helpful reminders to keep in mind for the continued success of this program:

- Please help us minimize contamination - do not include plastic bags, animal waste (including doggie bags and animal bedding), diapers, or other unaccepted items in the dumpsters. Refer to the Ramsey County guides for what is and is not accepted with organics recycling.
- The two dumpsters are serviced every Tuesday. These tend to become quite full, so make sure that you are using both of the dumpsters within the enclosure.
- There is a small bag dispenser located at the site for your convenience. Look for the green container located to the right of the gate as you exit the enclosure.
- A garbage can is now located next to the enclosure. This is for trash only and not an additional receptacle for organics or other recyclables.



2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The 2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project is nearly complete! The Contractor has completed final paving and boulevard restoration and will continue to address turf establishment repairs and project clean up into the fall. The optimal season for restoration (seeding) runs from spring to early summer and again from fall until the ground freezes. As the seed was applied in July, extra attention and care is required to ensure growth as the warm temperatures and dry conditions are not ideal growing and/or maintenance conditions. As the temperatures cool and precipitation increases with the fall weather, the newly seeded areas have optimal conditions to germinate and combat weeds.

Following establishment of the turf, we will continue to track the lawn restoration work and will be completing warranty inspections over the next two years. If something has not been completed, please call and we will do our best to get it addressed during the warranty period. You can contact Justin Messner at jmessner@wsbeng.com with these concerns.



Silver Lake Road Resurfacing

Ramsey County will be resurfacing Silver Lake Road between 37th Avenue north through the City of New Brighton to Interstate 694. Improvements include milling the top layer of the existing bituminous surface and installing a new, smooth pavement surface. Ramsey County has completed the removal and replacement of deficient pedestrian ramps, medians, and catch basins throughout the project and is anticipated to complete the mill and overlay improvements this fall.

County Road C Reconstruction

Ramsey County and Hennepin County have begun reconstructing County Road C (29th Avenue NE) from Highway 88 to Long Lake Road. Improvements along County Road C (29th Avenue NE) within the City of St. Anthony Village (Highway 88 to the eastern City limits) include reconstructing the existing roadway, installation of a 10-foot bituminous trail along the south side of the roadway, installation of a 6-foot concrete sidewalk along the north side of the roadway, and drainage improvements to accommodate area drainage. The County Road C (29th Avenue NE) improvements also include removal and replacement of the City's watermain and sanitary sewer system.



2020 Street and Utility Improvement Project

Preparation of plans and specifications are underway for the 2020 Street and Utility Improvement Project. Improvements identified for 2020 consist of reconstructing the following roadways (illustrated below):

- 32nd Avenue NE from Rankin Road to Croft Drive
- Croft Drive from 32nd Avenue NE to 31st Avenue NE
- Silver Lake Terrace from Silver Lane to the north terminate end



Proposed utility improvements include sanitary sewer and water main replacement including individual services to the right-of-way boundary and replacement of all hydrants, water valves, and manholes that do not meet current City standards, as well as new storm sewer and catch basins.

The bituminous mill and overlay of Silver Lane from Stinson Boulevard to Silver Lake Road is also identified to be included with the 2020 Street and Utility Improvement Project (illustrated below). Improvements are proposed to be completed in 2021.

Silver Lake Road and 33rd Avenue Signal Improvements

Traffic at this intersection has experienced periodic backups due to the left turning movements from both east and west bound traffic. The signal system at Silver Lake Road and 33rd Avenue has been modified to include a flashing yellow turn signal allowing traffic to make a left turn from Silver Lake Road.



Use of the flashing yellow arrow has been shown to have several benefits including minimizing delays and enhancing safety by reducing driver errors. A study conducted by the National Cooperative Highway Research Program determined that drivers had fewer crashes with flashing yellow left-turn arrows than with traditional yield-on-green signal configurations.

2019 Reclamite Project

The 2019 Reclamite Project is complete! The Contractor completed the application in ONE day with sweeping of the excess material completed in the days to follow. Similar to chip seal improvements, reclamite extends the life of the pavement without the application of loose rock on the surface, making reclamite a more cost-effective option for preserving city roadways with less impact to residents and motorists. After the oil is applied, the oil requires time to dry and “cure” which is typically 20 – 45 minutes. A light coating of sand is then applied and excess material swept 1-2 days following initial application.

Why reclamite? When reclamite is sprayed on the road, it penetrates deep into the surface to reinforce the binder that bonds the asphalt and aggregate together. Applying reclamite to a road improves the asphalt's durability, flexibility and viscosity so it can withstand the effects of the weather, the sun's ultraviolet rays, freeze-thaw conditions and the weight of traffic.

IMPORTANCE OF FIRE PREVENTION AND CONTINUED EDUCATION



Education through involvement is essential in countless aspects of our lives. People learn and retain information in many different ways, and typically through experience. At a young age we are taught lessons through participation, carrying those lessons with us over a lifetime.

Firefighters learn the same way. When a fire occurs, we pick apart every segment of the fire, from the prevention to the reaction. Many fire codes we see today are a direct result of learned experiences from a previous fire. Our main purpose is to prevent fires from ever starting; in turn saving lives and properties.

Updated codes are just one part of preventing fires, with education playing a big role. Questions around when fire education begins, and what we do as firefighters to keep people safe, are at the center of how we educate. First, we start the fire-prevention talks at young age. The moment a child steps foot into a fire station and receives a tour is the moment they begin their education on fire safety.

Most importantly, we do not want young children to be afraid of firefighters. It is important for them to know who is behind the mask and underneath the gear. A child running and hiding in a fire is the last thing we want to happen, that is why it's our diligence to create a safe rapport early on. In St. Anthony, we bring fire education into the schools and continue to build on



their education at each grade level. In-class education begins in kindergarten, and continues through a student's high school years. All fire safety material and lesson plans are tailored to the adolescents age and grade level. We educate students on topics such as, but not limited to: smoke alarms, home escape plans, and fire science.

Education doesn't end once a student graduates from high school. Fire prevention and education is necessary and continuous experience and learning process for all ages. For example, due to new construction materials and products, fires are constantly changing. As previously mentioned, we change codes to adapt to new information and experiences. This is the same with fire prevention. What some adults learned years ago is not necessarily applicable today.

Each year fire stations throughout the country observes fire prevention week. This is our time as firefighters to share fire prevention messages with our community. This is also when the St. Anthony Fire Department hosts an open house. We invite the community into our station so they can learn about different fire and medical topics. It's also a fun opportunity for children to see and sit inside the fire trucks, try on our gear and tour the station. This is a great time to begin your child's fire education, and make a lasting impact on the importance of fire safety and lifelong learning about fire prevention.

SISTER CITY UPDATE

The St. Anthony Sister City Association has received a donation of two published books from our City Sister in Salo, Finland. Written by a popular Finnish children's author and cartoonist, the books relate the stories of two famous Finnish epic tales, The Kalevala and The Seven Brothers through the eyes of dogs.
