Let's collectively continue to support businesses that call St. Anthony their home by offering our patronage.

Beyond the former Walmart site, there are other development opportunities in various stages of planning at this time. Check out the City's website under "Projects" for current status updates of significant senior housing projects.

Yet, it's not just developers who want to invest in St. Anthony. It is also evident (based on the green bags scattered throughout town) that many residents are undertaking home improvement projects, as pride of ownership continues.

Elections 2020

The City of St. Anthony is working closely with Hennepin and Ramsey counties to remain prepared for the 2020 elections during COVID-19.

Additionally, we also rely upon recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH). For more information, visit cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/election-polling-locations.html

To minimize direct contact with others, the CDC encourages everyone to vote by mail. All Minnesota voters are eligible to vote by mail. Registered voters do not need to provide a reason to vote by mail and can request a ballot now for both the state primary and general elections.

Visit sos.state.mn.us to request an absentee ballot.

Voters who wish to cast a ballot on Election Day are encouraged to follow CDC recommendations, such as maintaining six-feet of distance from other voters.

Four Years Going Strong: St. Anthony Recognized As Step 5 GreenStep City

Our City has once again been recognized as maintaining the highest level of the GreenStep Cities Program. GreenStep Cities is a voluntary challenge, assistance and recognition program to help cities achieve their sustainability and quality-of-life goals. It is a public/private partnership administered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.

For four years, St. Anthony has maintained the topmost Step 5 status. In 2017, during the first year Step 5 became available, St. Anthony was named one out of approximately 10 cities throughout the entire state of Minnesota to reach this highest level of achievement. Step 5 requires cities to complete metrics for the current conditions in the following topics: City Buildings and Lighting; Transportation Modes and Miles; Pervious Land, Parks and Trees; Stormwater; Renewable Energy; Infrastructure for Walking and Biking; Car, Transit and Bike Options; Drinking Water; Waste Water; Climate. Food Scraps Collection (organics recycling)

The City's food scraps collection (organic recycling) drop-off site is located on the south end of the Community Center parking lot (between the Police Department and the tennis courts). This site is open 24/7 and compostable bags are located in a dispenser at the site. Free starter kits are also available at City Hall. Pick up yours today!

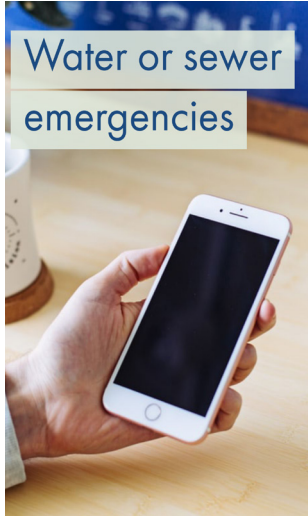


Water restrictions:

- No Watering between 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- Odd numbered addresses may water on odd dates.
- Even numbered addresses may water on even dates.
- Exemptions may be granted for recently established lawns.
- Water restrictions apply each year between April 1 through Nov. 1.

For after hours service, contact the Fire Department at 612-782-3400 or call 911.

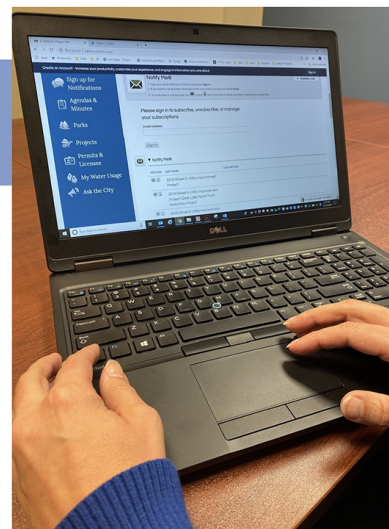
City crews will be dispatched to evaluate the situation and assist the property owner.

Remember, the property owner is responsible for maintaining water or sanitary sewer service from their building up to and including the connection to the main water or sewer lines. I & I (Inflow/Infiltration) inspection is required by the City prior to the sale of a house.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Update From Police Chief Mangseth

As a public safety agency, the St. Anthony Police Department (PD) continues to work closely with other city service providers and our community to provide a safe place to live, work and play.

As communities across the nation and the world continue efforts in addressing the coronavirus (COVID-19), our PD has been adjusting practices and procedures to ensure the safety of our staff and members of the public in accordance with recommendations from the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH), Center for Disease Control (CDC) and World Health Organization.

Modified policing services during COVID-19

Officers will continue to respond to all calls for service. However, as we monitor this situation and take note of ever-changing recommendations from health experts, we may be required to continue adjusting in-person services.

Residents may continue to encounter situations where low-priority calls are handled over the telephone or through a self-reporting form. Please know these are temporary measures as we work with healthcare partners, local first responders and emergency management partners, as we serve our communities. I encourage folks to contact the PD with any questions or concerns regarding current police operations.

The following PD services have been temporarily suspended during COVID-19:

- Citizen fingerprinting.
- Citizen use of the PD facility for groups/meetings.
- Citizen ride-along events.
- Public tours of the PD facility.
- Group events at the police department (Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, etc.)

We remain committed to working cooperatively and innovatively to address the challenges encountered by this viral illness and we ask our residents to engage in community hygiene practices as noted in guidelines

set forth by the CDC and MDH. cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/about/share-facts.html



Efforts made by our police officers and City staff to monitor compliance related to social distancing, among other orders issued through the Office of the Governor, have focused primarily on education. I remain encouraged by the support received from our residents during this time to continue with Gov. Walz direction and recommendations.

Staying connected and sharing good news

Our Community Engagement Officers along with our entire staff have put a considerable amount of time and consideration into content for our social media platforms in an effort to stay connected and provide up-to-date information to those in our service area. As a result, our online impact and following has increased.

Recently, Lt. Diegnau responded to a call where he and the St. Anthony Village Fire Department (FD) personnel rescued several baby ducks from a storm drain. Lt. Diegnau became aware that a citizen had taken photos of the activity and asked for copies. Those photos were then sent to Officer Rushton who posted them on Facebook. KARE-11 saw the post and highlighted it during their evening newscast. This small yet thoughtful act reflected well on every member of our PD and FD that responded to that call for service. Grill Cooking Safety

Cooking food on the grill is one of the best ways to enjoy our warm summer weather. Whether you have a charcoal or gas grill, it's important to inspect it before each use.

Depending on the type of grill, make sure it's safe and in good working condition. For example, if you have a propane gas grill, check the gas tank hose for any potential leaks.



The following checklist includes additional things to consider when cooking with grills:

- When lighting a gas grill, make sure the lid is open before lighting.
- Never leave the grill unattended while in use.
- Keep your grill clean. Remove grease or fat build up from the grates and tray below.
- Make sure your grill is away from your home, deck railing, and anything overhead that might catch fire from the radiant heat.
- Children and pets should be kept back at least three feet from the grill.
- If using a charcoal grill, make sure that you let the coals completely cool down before disposing of them into a metal container.

Housing Code:

Garbage and recycling: § 150.126

-Containers are not allowed in the front yard setback without approved screening or fencing.

Vehicles: § 152.179

-Unlicensed (expired tabs) or inoperable vehicles need to be stored in a garage or other building.

Addresses: § 97.02

-Address numbers should contrast with their background and be no less than 4 inches tall. This is to help out responders in case of an emergency.



CITY PROJECT UPDATES

County Road C Reconstruction

Ramsey County and Hennepin County began the reconstruction of County Road C (29th Avenue NE) from Highway 88 to Long Lake Road in 2019. Completed improvements along County Road C (29th Avenue NE) within the City of St. Anthony Village (Highway 88 to the eastern City limits) include removal and replacement of the City's watermain and sanitary sewer system, installation of storm sewer, and roadway paving (concrete).

The contractor has begun construction operations for 2020 and will continue with installation of a 10-foot bituminous trail along the south side of the roadway, installation of a 6-foot concrete sidewalk along the north side of the roadway and center median restoration, along with remaining project cleanup. Traffic has been reduced to one east bound lane and one west bound lane (outer lanes).

2020 Street And Utility Improvement Project

The 2020 Street and Utility Improvement Project is underway. The first items will be setting up traffic control signs, tree removals, installing the temporary water system, pavement removal, and sanitary sewer and watermain replacement. The project is proposed to be completed in phases to allow access to properties as feasible: **Phase 1:** 32nd Avenue; **Phase 2:** Croft Drive; **Phase 3:** Silver Lake Terrace

The contractor anticipates mobilizing multiple construction crews to complete all phases simultaneously; however, the schedule for each phase may vary slightly from one another as construction progresses throughout the summer. Should you have any questions or concerns with construction, please call Jake Grainger at 612-364-5319. He is on site to represent the City during construction.

The bituminous mill and overlay of Silver Lane from Stinson Boulevard to Silver Lake Road is also identified to be included with the 2020 Street and Utility Improvement Project; however the mill and overlay of Silver Lane will be completed with the final layer of asphalt in 2021.

Bringing Back The Bees

As people prepare their lawns for the summer months, reducing weeds and insects always seems to be a high priority. Reducing the number of bugs, moths and bees may seem like a good idea so people can spend more quality time outdoors. In reality, it's a major issue that affects everything from local habitat to U.S. agriculture and around the World. These insects are pollinators. As they travel from plant to plant they help pollinate flowers. These flowers can be native prairie or woodland plants, apples, raspberries, cucumbers, and even hay crops for the livestock industry. So even if thriving wildlife habitat doesn't peak your interest, being able to put food on the table should.



Between the loss of habitat, use of pesticides, insect disease, and crops designed to kill insects, pollinators are declining. While this may seem like a daunting national challenge to try and tackle, steps are being taken locally to bring the message to communities— all the way to individual yards.

At the local level, the State of Minnesota has provided the Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) funding to develop the “Lawns to Legumes” program that focuses on planting residential lawns with native vegetation and pollinator-friendly plants. The goal of this pilot program is to offer cost-share, technical assistance, and planting guides to eligible Minnesota residents to install pollinator-friendly native plantings in their yard. By turning the urban lawn desert into small pockets of pollinator friendly gardens, there will be an overall positive impact for these important species.

CITY PLANNING

Planning And Zoning: 2040 Comprehensive Plan Adopted

After a two-year process of research, community engagement, and local work-sessions, and another year of coordination with Met Council staff and officials to finalize the document (not to mention a few months of COVID-19-related delays), the St. Anthony 2040 Comprehensive Plan has been approved and adopted. The Plan lays out the community's vision and development (or redevelopment) plan for the next 20 years, with a particular focus on the next five and 10 year periods for more specific implementation strategies.

After an introduction, the plan contains chapters on the following topics: Community Visions and Goals; Community Profile; Land Use; Housing; Transportation; Sanitary Sewer; Water Supply; Sustainability; and finally, Implementation. It is a lengthy and critical document that guides the community's development patterns to maintain the Village's tradition of and expectations for high levels of public services. The recommendations of Chapter 10, the Implementation Chapter is also woven into St. Anthony's annual goal-setting process, along with serving as a guide for much of the work program for the Planning Commission and other public bodies.

Redevelopment of the former Walmart site

One of the most noticeable objectives of the Plan is already in action—the redevelopment of the former Walmart property into high-density multiple family housing. The redevelopment of this site was cited in the plan (reinforced by extensive community comments and surveys) as a major objective. The conversion of the 13-acre site from commercial to residential will provide additional customer traffic for the commercial neighborhood, and remove a highly visible vacant parcel from the public eye. The developers are aiming at a 2021 first-phase opening.

Affordable housing needs

Other goals include finding opportunities for affordable housing to address this pressing metro-wide need. St. Anthony utilizes the goals and objectives of the Comprehensive Plan to shape the community's support for affordability in a variety of ways – an effort that is already active and ongoing. The Housing Chapter of the Comprehensive Plan lays out several approaches to this issue.

Continuous process evaluation and implementation

There will be a series of studies that re-examine St. Anthony's zoning ordinance and map—the most common implementation tool for development and redevelopment management. These studies will range from detailed performance standards to more significant changes to zoning district land uses and opportunities. All of these will be a part of a continuous process of implementation until the next update is due, prior to 2030.

FINANCE

Our Commitment To Residents, Customers

The COVID-19 pandemic has substantially impacted all of our lives. Businesses and citizens are adapting to what we now call, a “new normal.” In response, the City of St. Anthony’s finance team has transformed how they manage their daily operations. With a continuing goal of excellent customer service, the City learned how to quickly adapt and balance the welfare of customers and employees with timely and effective responses, and to citizen concerns and questions.

With the rise of COVID-19 cases in early March, a plan was developed to have finance personnel rotate their work schedules with one person housed at City Hall and one person telecommuting from home. This adapted schedule reduced the potential of two employees with the same vital knowledge base of becoming ill at the same time. It also provided an additional layer of exposure prevention for staff and residents.

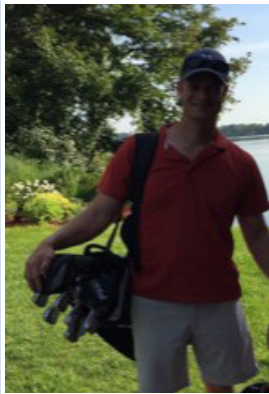
During a two-week period when City offices were temporarily closed, nearly all employees worked from home. During this time, the front office area was modified to reduce the risk of air borne transmission by installing glass and plexiglass dividers at the front-counter and at work stations.

And, with the City’s continued investment in technology, telecommuting staff received the necessary tools to function from home. This was coordinated via the City’s IT service, Metro-INET, a consortium of over 40 metro cities sharing IT infrastructure and staffing.

Mero-INET provided the ability for phones to send voice message transcripts to email, allowing for a quicker response to residents, vendors and contractors. Utility billing questions, building permit requests, accounts payable and receivable inquiries, and zoning issues were addressed quickly and customers likely did not know that employees were telecommuting. Payroll, accounting functions and audit preparation continued without interruption.

As the City of St. Anthony begins to slowly re-open, staff have learned valuable lessons from telecommuting and how to effectively and promptly address resident needs and concerns from a non-City Hall setting. All finance staff are technologically prepared (and practiced) to work from home. In the event that the City and its residents are impacted by unforeseen events, staff are ready and committed to continue to provide excellent customer service, whether from City Hall’s newly renovated and safety-focused service window, or from their home office.

Help Keep Our Bodies of Water Clean

Did you know that storm drains are connected directly to rivers, lakes, and streams? Debris left in the street and on the sidewalks, such as turf grass clippings and leaves will ultimately wash into storm drains and flow into our bodies of water. Grass and leaves contain phosphorus, a chemical element that encourages algae growth, ultimately turning our rivers, lakes, and streams green in color and scummy. Certain types of algae can contain toxins, but more commonly can suppress the oxygen supply in water. We can protect our bodies of water by preventing this debris from entering the storm water drainage system. Here are a few things you can do to help keep our water bodies clean:

- Direct clippings away from hard surfaces. If clippings are left on hard surfaces, rain will wash them into the storm drain and they will flow into our water bodies.
- Clean up clippings that land on hard surfaces. Sweep or blow them back onto the turf, collect for composting, or bag and dispose of in designated yard waste receptacles.
- Leave clippings on the turf. Grass clippings left on the turf will break down and act as a round of fertilizer, promoting thick and healthy growth.
- Rake or mulch leaves: Leaves that are left to blow through the City may end up in storm drains and are then deposited into our water bodies.

As an Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) community, St. Anthony regulates non-stormwater discharges to the storm drainage system. City Code Chapter 50: Storm Water and Sanitary Sewers, Section 50.30 – Illicit Discharge and Connection contains enforcement actions the City can take in the event an illicit discharge occurs. If discovered, please contact the City at 612-782-3301. Sources of Illicit Discharge:

- Sanitary wastewater
- Sediment from construction site runoff
- Landscape waste
- Paints, solvents
- Used oil, radiator flushing, grease
- Cleaning products
- Spills from accidents
- Improper disposal of household toxics
- Laundry wastewaters
- Illegal connections to the storm sewer system
- Commercial car wash wastewater
