STUDENTS IN GOVERNMENT

On May 31, city staff and council participated in the inaugural Students in Government Day with students from St. Anthony Village High School. We began with an overview of the city's organizational and governance structure as well programs and current projects. Students were then paired with a department head for a tour and department specific activities. Next, students met individually with the mayor and city council members. We concluded with a meal and time to recap the day.

These bright and articulate students asked many insightful questions spanning a variety of topics, and one particular question stood out. One student asked, "What is the purpose of this activity?" I greatly appreciated the question because it is the question we need to continue to ask, in order to ensure we are aligned with our mission, vision, strategic initiatives and goals. In this case, I was able to respond that our purpose was to increase understanding regarding the purpose and function of local government and to nurture relationships.

Throughout the day, many students' comments centered on the theme, "I had no idea the city did that" or "I never fully appreciated [fill in the name of a service or program]." 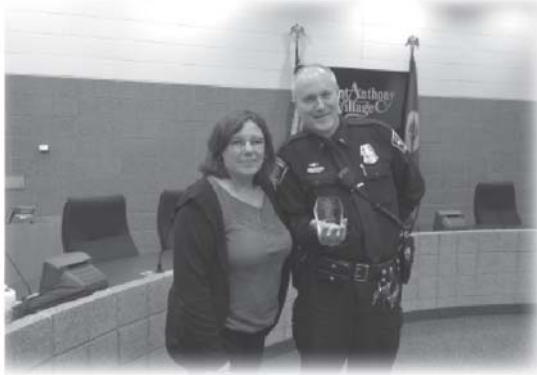

SAINT ANTHONY VILLAGE RECEIVES GREENSTEP CITIES STEP 5

Saint Anthony Village became one of the first six cities in the state to receive the 5th Step of the GreenStep Cities program.

GreenStep Cities is a public/private partnership administered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. Step 5 requires cities to complete metrics for the current conditions in the following topics: City Buildings and Lighting; Transportation Modes and Miles; Pervious Land, Parks and Trees; Stormwater; Renewable Energy; Infrastructure for Walking and Biking; Car, Transit and Bike Options; Drinking Water; Waste Water; Climate.

Now that data is recorded for each of these metrics, the city's progress can be tracked and compared as time passes to see how the improvements and investments that were made have changed the conditions of the city's progress towards sustainability.

How would you like to improve the safety of your neighborhood, have a fun time with your neighbors, build community and take part in a huge statewide program?

You can do it all at this year's Minnesota Night to Unite (NTU) celebration on Tuesday, August 1st! For residents of St. Anthony, this is an opportunity to put together a neighborhood celebration, turn on the front porch lights, gather with neighbors and friends, get to know one another, catch up on things, play some games with the kids, enjoy a few hot-off-the-grill favorites, have some ice cream, receive a visit from the police/fire department and build a sense of community.

On Tuesday, August 1st, 2017 from approximately 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm the St. Anthony Police Department invites St. Anthony neighborhoods to join neighborhoods throughout Minnesota for this fun filled evening.



What is building community?

This is a simple but powerful method for people to improve their own and others' living conditions. At its most basic, this is neighbors working together to create positive changes in their neighborhoods; whether they're trying to reduce crime, look out for each other's property, or get involved in the community. People working together with shared understandings and expectations are what provide an atmosphere of strong community. A strong community sends a message to criminals letting them know that our neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Already involved in a neighborhood crime watch group?

NTU will help keep your group active. This is important. Neighbors who know each other and agree to watch out for suspicious behavior are a great defense against crime. If you do not have a crime watch group, NTU is a great way to get neighbors together for the first time and start building relationships. You can make your NTU event as simple or as elaborate as you like. The main point of this evening is for residents to gather as neighbors to affirm their commitment to a safe, healthy community.

Get your children involved in this event. Kids bring great energy and enthusiasm to NTU events. Get all ages busy with your NTU planning this year. Involving children and teens can have a great long-term benefit for your block.

Can my apartment complex sign up for Night to Unite?

Apartment complexes are neighborhoods, within themselves, and are encouraged to plan an event. As you plan your NTU event, try to draw in all the people you can. Everyone benefits when neighbors know each other. The connections that are made and strengthened through NTU carry far beyond this evening.

Will there be ice cream certificates?

In keeping with tradition, The St. Anthony Cub Foods Store (3930 Silver Lake Rd) is again partnering with the Police Department in promoting Minnesota "Night to Unite" events. The Cub Store is providing a 5 quart pail of Kemps vanilla ice cream to each resident who hosts a party on August 1st.

How do I register my Night to Unite Event?

Residents with questions, or who plan to host a block party on August 1st, are asked to visit the Village of St. Anthony website: www.savmn.com. Click on the News Flash item Night to Unite and fill out the request form electronically. You will automatically receive a confirmation email. You may also download a copy of the registration form and mail or fax it to the Police Department. Please register by Thursday, July 27th. Please fully complete the registration form and note whether you request visits from the Police Department, Fire Department and city staff. The Police Department will deliver ice cream certificates prior to Night to Unite (Note: to be able to accommodate requests for ice cream certificates in a timely manner, only those who sign up prior to the July 27th deadline will receive certificates). The City Public Works Department will deliver street barricades, to the host address, for those that indicate the request on the registration form. I will notify the Public Works Department of barricade needs. In addition, I will provide block lists to the St. Anthony Fire Department, the Honorable Mayor, City Council and City Staff.

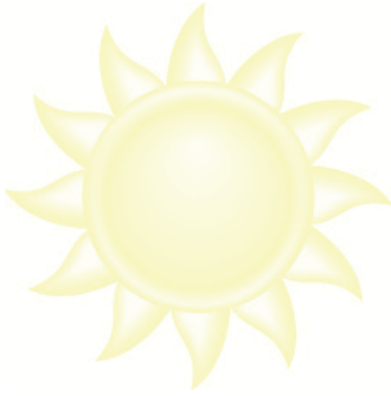

COLLABORATIVE REFORM UPDATE

The Department of Justice (DOJ) concluded their fourth site visit to the City of St. Anthony Police Department back on May 4th. The COPS Office is now in the midst of the assessment phase of the Collaborative Reform Initiative for Technical Assistance (CRI-TA).

The goal of the CRI-TA is to assess, monitor, and assist the SAPD, in concert with the community, in the implementation and sustainment of reforms that improve community-oriented policing practices, transparency, professionalism, accountability, and public trust, taking into account national standards, promising practices, current and emerging research, and community expectations.

Collaborative Reform with the Saint Anthony Police Department has focused on assessing law enforcement contacts with the public, including traffic stops, as well as enhancing community policing, and enhancing public safety by taking into account national standards, best practices, existing research and community expectations.

The next phase of CRI-TA will involve the drafting of recommendations based on the assessment currently being conducted. We eagerly look forward to being presented with a draft version of the recommendations sometime in the early part of the fall.

FIREWORKS SAFETY

Summer celebrations and holidays are upon us and fireworks are a staple for many of them. While we are traveling near and far to purchase the prettiest, the brightest and the loudest of all fireworks, it's important to educate ourselves on fireworks safety. Knowing the dangers is very important. Sparklers for instance, they seem harmless but did you know they burn at a temperature that reaches 1,800°F? That is almost double the melting temperature of glass! Now you can only imagine if a little sparkler can produce that much heat what other fireworks are capable of. Below are a few tips to keep you and everyone safe while you celebrate through the warmer months:



- Read and obey all local laws regarding use of fireworks
- Store your purchased fireworks in a cold, dry place and out of reach of children
- Never allow children to use or play with fireworks
- A responsible adult should supervise all firework activity
- Never re-lite a “dud” (firework that doesn’t combust when lit).
- “Duds” should be soaked in water 25 minutes after your first attempt to lite
- Always have a connected hose with your water line open or a bucket of water nearby.

The safest way to enjoy the show; grab a few chairs, a few friends, some snacks and go to your local festival where all fireworks will be handled by the experts. Relax and enjoy the show. Enjoy your summer and stay safe.

TRI CITY BODY CAMERA WORKGROUP

The Tri-City Body Camera Work Group concluded its review of current police policies and protocols, best practices and trends, policy development and has presented recommendations to the Police Chief for the drafting of a Body Worn Camera Policy. The group met on a monthly basis from January through April when a BWC draft policy was reviewed and considered. The group was facilitated by Burnsville Police Chief Eric Gieseke, who was able to provide his vast base of knowledge and experience, as his police department was one of the first police agencies to bring BWC technology to MN, back in 2011. The group received information presented by outside subject matter experts regarding:



- Current MN State Statutes regarding BWC's.
- MN Data Practices and how MN State Statute deals with information recorded by portable video recording devices.
- How outside agencies assist in investigating police critical incidents, including policy considerations reference BWC's.
- Technology consideration concerning BWC's, data storage and redaction.

Once the policy is finalized, a date will be announced for an upcoming city council meeting where there will be an opportunity for public comment. The police department plans to implement BWC's sometime in the late fall of this year.

The St. Anthony Police Department is very committed to implementing Body Worn Cameras in our ongoing effort to enhance community trust and transparency.

HOW DO I.....CHECK ON MY WATER USAGE?

Keeping an eye on your household water usage will be easier starting June 30th. On that date, the Water customer portal becomes available on the City's website. The portal features include:

- The Dashboard – a snapshot your current water usage along with status reporting on the self-established usage parameters set for your household.
- The Usage Details tab- allows you to review usage data, paired with temperature and rainfall information. You can select the time ranges of interest, i.e. hourly, weekly and annually.
- The Settings tab- provides you the ability to define quarterly and daily usage goals along with alerting you of potential water leaks while on vacation.

The link to the Water customer portal can be found under the "How do I" section on the City's website.

To establish your portal account, you'll need your account number and billing zip code. Your e-mail address will be your user ID, and you be asked to create a password and provide a cell phone number if you want alerts to be delivered as text messages. Please contact Utility billing at 612-782-3301 if you encounter any issues in account set-up. With the summer months upon us, it's a good time to take advantage of this tool to boost water conservation!



GOVERNMENT ALLIANCE ON RACE AND EQUITY (GARE)

The City of St. Anthony 2017 GARE cohort has been continuing their participation in the year-long series. In April, the team met with the 16 other teams from other cities, county and state departments in Shoreview. The teams talked about the history of their jurisdictions, and were introduced to concepts and tools for discussing race equity and demonstrating leadership in integrating equity into day-to-day operations.

In May, the team was invited to Bloomington to hear three panelists discuss their experiences in advancing racial equity. We heard from Terri Thao from Nexus Community Partners, Vina Kay from Voices for Racial Justice, and Nadine Graves from We Are All Criminals (WAAC).

The panel was insightful, and offered encouragement to all the local government representatives in attendance to further this important work.

In June, we met with the other cohorts to strategize for the building of our racial equity plan, which will be the end product of the introductory GARE series.

Did you know that crime fluctuates with the seasons? According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, victimization of household property crimes occurred at higher rates during the summer than any other season. Here are a few tips to keep you, your family, and your property safe as the temperatures start to rise.

With the summer heat and beautiful weather, it can be easy to forget to close up the house. The majority of burglaries occur during the day. Whether you are working on the yard or having a barbeque, it's important to remember to lock doors, close the garage, and shut windows. Open garage doors are an ideal target for burglars. Criminals are able to gain easy access not only to the tools and other equipment in your garage, but also into your home! Once inside criminals can grab items quickly and run off without being noticed.

Now that kids will be home from school while parents are away at work, it's also important to remind them of few things they can do to stay safe. Remind your young ones not to let anyone in the house without a parent at home. If they do not recognize someone at the door, call a trusted adult or law enforcement.

Remind them also not to do anything at home alone they are not allowed to do unless their parents are there.

Remember, most individuals who are victims of crimes believe they were well prepared or never thought it would happen to them. Ask a neighbor to watch your house while you are away, ask someone to mow your lawn, set lights up on timers inside your home, and have motion lights outside your house. Giving the impression that someone is home will assist in keeping burglars out.

ENGINEERING UPDATES

2016 Street and Utility Improvement Project

The project is substantially complete with the Contractor anticipated to complete final wear paving and pavement striping late July/early August, weather permitting, in coordination with the signal improvements at the intersections of Stinson Boulevard and 39th Avenue and Stinson Boulevard and 37th Avenue.



2017 Street and Utility Improvement Project

Utility improvements, including installation of storm sewer, watermain, and sanitary sewer have been completed on phase 1 of the project. The Contractor will continue road building operations with phase 1 over the next few weeks in anticipation of bituminous paving.

Utility improvements on phase 2 has begun and will continue through July. Substantial completion for the entire project which includes, driveway restoration, concrete curb, bituminous base paving, and topsoil replacement is anticipated for late August with turf restoration to be completed in September.



LED Street Lighting- Silver Lake Road from 37th Avenue to 694

The Contract has been awarded to Killmer Electric Co., Inc. Installation of the new LED lighting is anticipated to begin late summer.

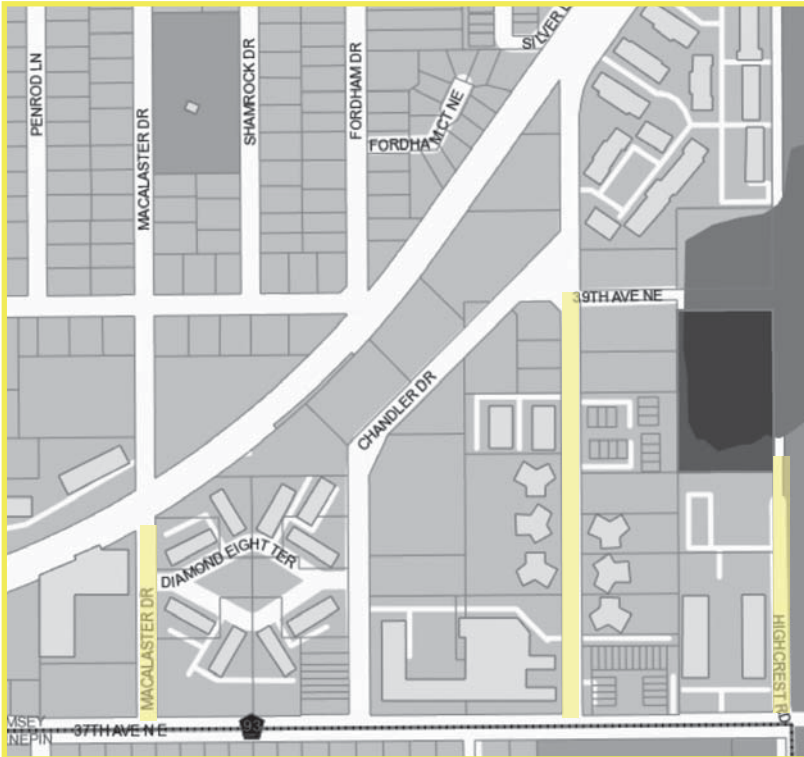
Construction of the new AOP Water Treatment Plant is complete, and the equipment is currently being calibrated and measured for quality performance. This work, along with restoration, is anticipated to be complete by mid July. The official Ribbon Cutting Ceremony to open the new plant will be on August 9th.

ENGINEERING UPDATES

2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project

Staff has begun work on the feasibility report for the 2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project. The project includes complete street and utility reconstruction along the following roadways:

- Macalaster Drive NE from 37th Avenue NE to cul-de-sac to the north
- Foss Road from 37th Avenue NE to Chandler Drive NE
- Highcrest Road from 37th Avenue NE to cul-de-sac to the north



Additionally, included for the 2018 Street and Utility Improvement Project is the mill & overlay of Anthony Lane from 29th Avenue to the end of the cul-de-sac.



2017 37th Avenue Sidewalk & Signal Project

The Contractor has installed the retaining walls along the south side of 37th Avenue and is completing the installation of new sidewalk from Stinson Blvd. to Highcrest Rd. Beginning in July, new pedestrian push buttons, wheelchair accessible curb ramps, and crosswalk countdown timers will be installed at the signalized intersections of 39th Avenue and Stinson Blvd., 37th Avenue and Stinson Blvd., Silver Lane and Silver Lake Road, 39th Avenue and Silver Lake Road, 37th Avenue and Silver Lake Road, and Highcrest Road and 37th Avenue.



Mirror Lake Dredging Project

The Contractor has tentatively completed all sediment removal and restoration and will continue turf restoration maintenance throughout summer. The Contractor will continue with sediment removal from the lake beginning in the winter after the lake freezes over.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND PLANNING

Abraham Lincoln said "the best way to predict the future is to create it yourself." Communities with a vision for the future are more likely to become successful than those that do not actively plan.

Public participation invites citizens and residents to become involved and have a direct voice in the design, development and identify of their city, town or neighborhood making it more likely the outcome reflects the general wishes of the community.

Benefits of citizen participation to the planning process:

- Broader range of ideas on public issues.
- Generates public support for planning decisions.
- May reduce conflict and the time required to reach consensus.

- Creates a spirit of cooperation and trust between city staff, elected officials, consultants/planners and the public.

- The concept of a "citizen stakeholder" emerges.

- Project consultants/planners benefit from the clarity citizen involvement contributes.

Participation may take different forms, the more formal, traditional version exemplified as input provided by the Planning Commission and its less formal counterpart: "public engagement meetings." Regardless, both play an important role in bringing resident inputs forward. Earlier city planning revolved around adequate sanitation, the movement of goods and people and incorporating resident amenities where possible.

Today, planners are also called upon to balance the conflicting demands of social equity, economic growth, environmental sensitivity, and aesthetic appeal.

An informed, active and involved citizenry is an invaluable asset. Saint Anthony city staff, council and the mayor have enabled the "informed" component via scheduled council meetings, citizen led bodies and general communication, thereby setting the table for residents to become active and involved.

The Comprehensive Plan defines St. Anthony's vision regarding housing, transportation, parks, water resource policy and land use in general – I encourage you to find your own way to participate.
